Mel Carter Spectacular Free to TCC Students, Staff and Faculty

The Evening of Entertainment, sponsored by the student government's Entertainment Committee, will be held tonight at no cost to students, faculty or staff of Tacoma Community College.

The Government of the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College agreed, last Thursday, to change the prices of the Mel Carter Spectacular by allowing students, faculty and staff to be admitted free and charging those coming from off campus the original price of \$3.50.

GASTCC felt that by admitting TCC students at no charge more students would be getting a greater benefit from the ten dollars which is taken from registration fees and is allotted to student government.

Upon entering the dress-up dance TCC students will be given a numbered ticket and during the dance a drawing will be held at which time door prizes of a portable television set, a portable tape-recorder and a portable typewriter

Summer Session Open to Public

An article in the April 5, issue of the Challenge gave the impression that enrollment in Tacoma Community College summer session will be limited to presently enrolled TCC students.

"It isn't so," says H. J. Schafer, director of community services. Enrollment is open to college students from any institution, the general public, and June 1968 high school graduates who want to get a head start on college—even if they plan to enroll at a different college in the fall.

It is true that the first two and a half hours of registration for the summer session—from 8 to 10:30 a.m. June 17—are limited to students currently enrolled here.

Schafer noted that tuition for this summer session will be less than the \$10 per credit charged last year. Tuition charges this summer will be six dollars per credit hour and \$70 for a full load of 12 or more credits.

MUN To Represent TCC

The Model United Nations Club is sending sixteen delegates to Tucson, Arizona on April 24-28 to attend the MUN of the Far West Assembly. The Conference will be held on the University of Arizona campus and will provide those attending a "first hand" look at the organization and procedures of the United Nations.

There are over 40 schools that will be represented, and each of those countries has been assigned a country to represent during the assembly. The MUN Club of TCC has been assigned the country of Peru and has been preparing for their representation since November.

Most of the MUN club members will be attending the conference, since they have devoted time, energy and planning of several money raising projects since October. The club has held two dances, several bake sales, and a money tree project which, combined, has raised enough money to send three more delegates in the delegation. Last year the club was budgeted enough, by GASTCC, to send twelve delegates to the conference. With the money that has already been raised and the last minute funds which will be collected, a total of sixteen students will be attending.

The delegation will leave Portland the morning of the 24th and arrive in Los Angeles 2½ hours later. After an hour lay over, they

will be on the way, again, to Tucson, arriving in the afternoon. Upon arrival in Tucson the group will be housed in the Executive Inn, (pool, "playroom", lounge, and all) which is about a mile from the campus where the meetings will be held.

The delegation will then return on Sunday with, "hopefully" a better knowledge of the U.N. organization and problems facing international politics.

Al had hidden the motorcycle in a nearby empty classroom and when it was time for his reading

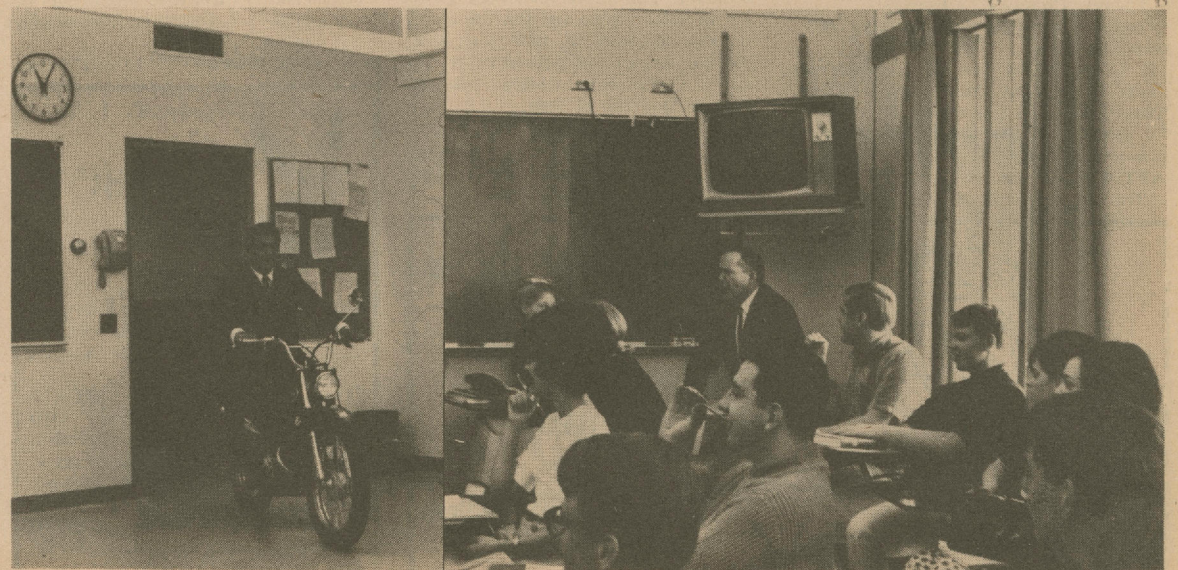

EDITORIALS . . .

Student government, for many years now a virtually powerless body which has been permitted by the administrators of our nation's high schools and colleges to simply passify the students, is shocking faculty and administration alike with newly achieved power and increasing demands.

Although the high school faculties and administrations still insist on developing status quo followers rather than creative thinkers by giving students no real voice, college students have made large steps toward direct participation in the running of their institutions.

For example, at Park College, Parville, Mo., students now share in making administrative and academic decisions. They serve on faculty committees, evaluate current faculty members (according to *College Management* a growing trend on U.S. campuses) and even interview applicants for teaching positions.

Here at Tacoma Community College the student government has gotten its "foot in the door" in getting a representative on the Administrative Council. It can open the "door" and advance towards becoming a powerful body in the running of this college, or it can be put down by the administration or the faculty—the choice is yours.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTION CHANGES

ARTICLE III

THE GOVERNMENT OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF TACOMA COMMUNITY COLLEGE

Section 1. The Government of the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College shall consist of the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, Freshman Class President, Sophomore Class President, and 4 elected representatives from each class. The office of the Government of the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College President shall be filled by the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College President. The office of the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Vice-President shall be filled by the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Vice President. The office of the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Secretary shall be filled by the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Secretary. The office of the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Treasurer shall be filled by the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Treasurer at the first meeting of the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College, a member of the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College shall be subject to approval by the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College.

(Proposed change—omit starting second sentence: "The office . . . to . . . filled by the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Treasurer.") Last sentence . . . after "a member of the"—omit . . . "Government of . . ."

ARTICLE III—Section 3.

The Government of Associated Stu-

dents of Tacoma Community College shall be responsible to the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College and regulate activities thereof.

(Proposed change — insert "and policies" after "and regulated activities . . .")

ARTICLE III—Section 9

The Sophomore Class President shall perform the duties of the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College President in the absence of the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College President and Vice-President.

(Proposed change—omit "Sophomore Class President" and insert "ASB Treasurer" and add another sentence—"In the absence of the above, the Sophomore Class President shall assume the ascribed powers.")

ARTICLE III—Section 10

The Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College shall be responsible for coordinating with the Dean of Students Office the publication of a Student Handbook.

(Proposed change—add to the sentence—"when published by this college."

ARTICLE IV—Section 2

ELECTIVE OFFICERS

The term of office for the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College officers will be from the first day of Fall Quarter to the last day of Spring Quarter, with elections to be held in the Spring Quarter. The officers who are elected to take office on the first day of Fall Quarter of 1966 will serve as the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College for the Spring Quarter of 1966.

(Proposed change—First sentence—change "Fall Quarter" to "Summer Quarter" and omit the last sentence in its entirety.

Students to Have Chance to Voice Political Views

The National Collegiate Presidential Primary, Choice '68, will be held here April 23 and 24.

Choice '68 has been designed to give college students the opportunity to voice their political views.

Elections will be held April 23 at 7:30 p.m. in a classroom building where night students will show their identification cards and be permitted to vote by punching an IBM card.

Elections for day students will be held April 24 at 11 a.m. when pollers will pass out the IBM cards during class.

Candidates range from Fred Halstead of the Socialist Worker Party to Lyndon B. Johnson, Robert F. Kennedy, Richard Nixon, Harold E. Stassen and many more.

Students will also voice their opinions on Vietnam by answering the questions, "What course of military action should the United States pursue in Vietnam," and "What course of action should the United States pursue in regards to the bombing of North Vietnam?"

ARTICLE IV—Section 4

The Freshman Class elections of officers shall be held prior to the first day of November with term of office from November 1 until the last day of Spring Quarter.

(Proposed change—omit "from November 1 until the last day of Spring Quarter" and add "from the first day following their final fall election until the last day of Spring Quarter.") (Add a new Section 6.

"Section 6. One of the four Sophomore representatives to GASTCC shall be elected in the Fall Quarter within the same election as the Freshmen."

ARTICLE V ACTIVITIES COUNCIL MEMBERSHIP, OFFICERS, AND AUTHORITY

Section 5. The Secretary for the Activities Council will perform the duties of Chairman at the Activities Council meetings in the absence of the Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Vice-President, and the Government of Associated Students of Tacoma Community College Secretary will take minutes.

(Proposed change—omit "The Secretary for the Activities Council" and substitute . . . "The Sophomore Class Representative to Activities Council"

ARTICLE X—Section 3.

NEWSPAPER
The Associated Students of Tacoma Community College shall be responsible for the financial support of the newspaper.

(Proposed change—"the newspaper"

A final election will be held May 3 and the results will be announced at the dance.

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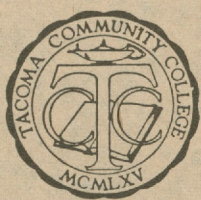

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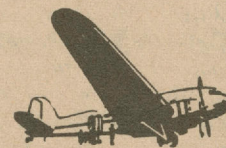

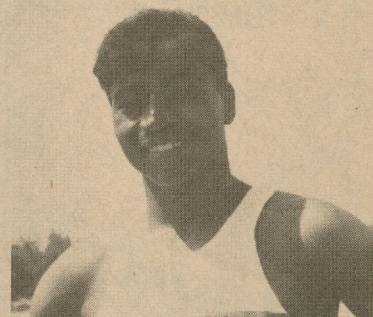

A sad day has dawned for Tacoma track coach Ed Fisher. With a chance for the state community college track championship within sight, the Titan team was setrucked with the loss of 11 key performers due to eligibility requirements.

Among those "counted-on" by Coach Fisher was Howard Draine, perhaps one of the top sprinters this season. Before his ineligibility ruling, Draine raced to a 7.2 clocking in the 70 yard dash at the Washington State University Meet, and finished well ahead of his competitors.

Carl Peterson, the state community college champ last season in the shot-put will also be out of action this season. Peterson heaved the shot 48' 11" for his winning effort at the state meet.

Long jumper Mike Elston, another returnee is also lost to the team along with lettermen Bruce Walker and Mike Cottrell.

First year hopefuls Paul Hayes, Mike Wright, and Ross Briggs have also been ruled ineligible.

Overall, Coach Fisher has predicted that a possible 30-40 points in the upcoming state meet have gone to the wayside.

All there is left is to hope for the best from the remaining TCC performers who will, most assuredly, carry the Titan colors as best they can for the remainder of the year. They are a dedicated bunch of guys and you can be sure that they'll be out there trying!

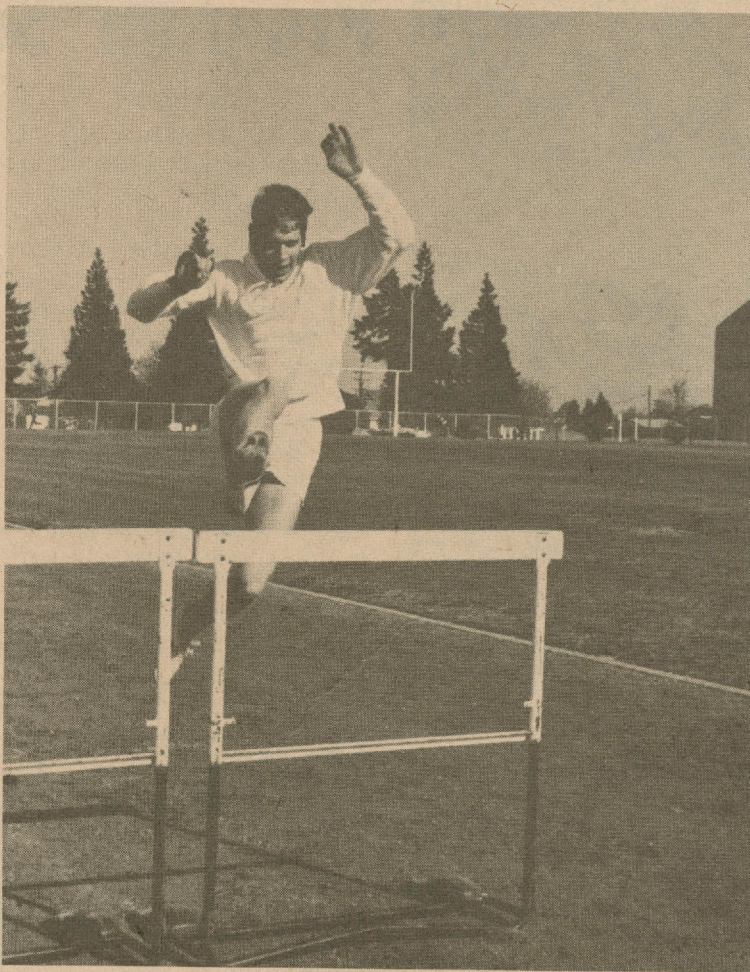

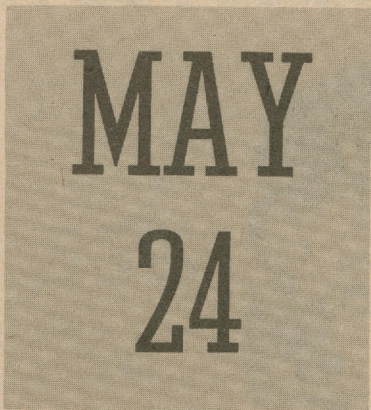
Illness Hampers Tennis Team Oly. Match Scheduled Monday

Coach Harland Malyon still hopes to find some tennis players to add to the squad. It is now impossible for the team to play when one of the regular players cannot make it.

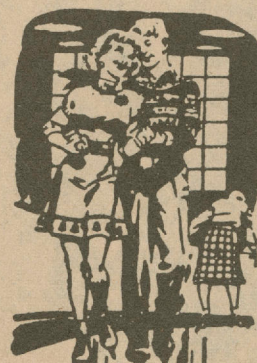
The team hopes to be up to strength for next week's busy schedule. The team will have four matches—Centralia, Olympic and Everett away from home — and a rematch here against Centralia.
