SURVEY

Unannounced and in casual attire, Akhee Saliba, the Student Complaints Officer at Rutgers U. in New Brunswick, N.J., got some rude treatment one day in a campus office. He decided to look further into students' relationships with the campus bureaucracy by conducting an attitude survey.

He discovered many students harbored "negative perceptions" and noted that "front line personnel (such as secretaries and receptionists) are the carriers of this animosity."

He also discovered that the top campus concerns of students are, in order, tuition cost, intercampus transportation, and campus security. (About half of the females rated security their most important concern.)
