## TCC students flay UPS investments in firms linked to South Africa

Tacoma Community College students have asked their counterparts at University of Puget Sound to condemn the university's investments in firms that do business with South Africa.

Until that happens, a TCC student spokesman said, the TCC students will no longer join the UPS student body in co-sponsoring entertainment and other events of interest to both groups. Each student group has been contributing about \$5,000 a year for the joint events, bringing such attractions as jazz great Dizzy Gillespie here.

TCC student representatives passed a resolution Wednesday asking for UPS student body action because of South Africa's apartheid policies, said James Martin, TCC student body president.

Greg Brewis, assistant to the president at UPS, said the university had not received a copy of the resolution passed by the TCC student senate, but had received a letter from three UPS students asking that the board of trustees adopt an investment policy.

The UPS students' letter and the question of whether UPS should be investing in firms that do business in South Africa will be taken up by the board's finance committee at one of its meetings this summer, Brewis said.

"It's a legitimate question that they have raised," he said.

Brewis said the committee also will review at that meeting the university's portfolio to see if it does in fact have investments in corporations that do business in South Africa.
