### PROJECT PROPOSAL SUBMITTED

TCC has submitted a proposal to the National Science Foundation, office of experimental projects and programs, ethical and human value implications of science and technology programs.

The preliminary proposal is in the area of "ethical and human value implications of science and technology."

Principal investigator is Ivonna McCabe, instructor of biology. Suggestions for the project include a workshop-seminar on the scientific and value issues related to genetics and genetic engineering. Dissemination of the information aired at the workshop is part of the proposal.

CALL TO ORDER

Chairperson Brown called the meeting to order at 2:35 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Mr. Brown explained to the Council members that the minutes of the meeting held on August 21, 1975, would not be published because the person assigned the task was no longer with the College. He then entertained a motion for the acceptance of the Council minutes of September 19, 1975.

MOTION: Wendy Pennell moved that the minutes of the Council meeting on September 18, 1975, be accepted as published.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Mr. Brown informed the body that the Traffic and Parking Regulations Sub-Committee had not met. He stated that he would schedule a meeting prior to the Council's next meeting and report the results at the regular meeting.

REVISIONS SUB-COMMITTEE

Doreen Amoroso, presenting the report of the Revisions Sub-Committee to the members, explained those areas of the Report of the Sub-Committee on Governance Planning on which her sub-committee members arrived at a consensus and those areas on which her sub-committee members were not completely in accord.

MOTION: Ivonna McCabe moved that the Council accept the report of the Revisions Sub-Committee and submit it as an addendum to the Report of the Sub-Committee on Governance Planning

Joe Kosai seconded the motion.

The motion passed.

A discussion evolved pertaining to whether the Revisions Sub-Committee's report could be incorporated in the Governance Planning Report. To resolve the issue, the following motion was made:

MOTION: Ivonna McCabe moved that the Council submit both reports to the President with the recommendation that the Revisions Sub-Committee's report be incorporated in the Governance Planning Report.

Bob Lathrop seconded the motion.

The period of discussion which followed resulted in the amendment below:

AMENDMENT: Doreen Amoroso amended the motion to state that the Council recommend to the President that those items in the Revisions Sub-Committee's report on which there was a consensus be incorporated in the Governance Planning Report and submitted to the Board, with all other items in the Revisions Sub Committee's report being submitted to the Board in a separate report.

Ivonna McCabe seconded the amendment.

The amendment passed with Wendy Pennell abstaining.

MAIN MOTION AS AMENDED: That the Council submit the Report on Governance Planning and the Revisions Sub-Committee's report to the President to be presented to the Board of Trustees with the recommendations that those items in the Revisions Sub-Committee report on which there was a consensus be incorporated into the Report on Governance Planning, with all other items in the Revisions Sub-Committee's report being submitted to the Board as a separate report.

Joanne McCarthy seconded the motion.

The motion passed with Wendy Pennell abstaining.

BUDGET RECOMMENDATIONS/STUDENT BUDGETING PROCESS/REVIEW OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES AGENDA

Dr. Stevens, reviewing the items on the Board of Trustees agenda, provided the background for the major items and the reports scheduled to be presented to the Board. Using the overhead projector, he explained the revisions in the 1975-76 budget and stated that he would recommend that the Board approve the budget as revised.

He complimented the work performed by the Ad Hoc Committee formed to study the policies regarding students services and activities fees.

MOTION: Doreen Amoroso moved that the Council endorse the Board of Trustees' Agenda for October 23, 1975.
