TWO TCC STUDENTS TO PERFORM IN STATE BICENTENNIAL PRODUCTION

Two TCC music students will be touring the state this summer as Bicentennial ambassadors.

HECTOR CRUZ and JANET EIDSMOE have been selected to participate in the "We've Got the Spirit" musical review, the official state Bicentennial travelling festival.

HECTOR and JANET will be part of the cast of 24 selected from all the community colleges in the state which will present 86 performances in a 114-day tour.

The review is administered by the Community College District 17, in Spokane.

"It's the biggest thing that has ever happened to me so far," said HECTOR.

Both are 24 years old and plan musical careers.

They travelled to Spokane the weekend of February 6 for orientation and casting.

"It really is exciting," JANET said.

The students will be rehearsing in Spokane during spring quarter, earning credits and having their tuition and expenses paid.

Opening day is May 4, 1976, in Spokane.

The show will play in Tacoma on July 1.

The pair were selected after an audition in Tacoma on January 6.

MEMBERS PRESENT: Doreen Amoroso, Lloyd Berntson, Russ Clark, Tim Keely, Ron Magden, Dale Potter, Robert Rhule (chairman), Joan Royce, Lorraine Stephan, Bob Thornburg, Pat Loth (secretary).

GUESTS PRESENT: Devon Edrington, Yun-yi Ho, Dave Whisner.

1. English as a Second Language Program Progress Report -- Bob Thornburg reported that the class, which has been in session for one week, has 20 students -- 10 Vietnamese, 4 Koreans and 6 Spanish Surnames. Four speak very little English.
2. Spring Quarter Schedule Development Progress -- Doreen Amoroso reported that it is hoped to have the schedule ready for printing by February 5 and ready for distribution by February 13.
3. Summer Schedule -- Dr. Rhule reminded the Committee once again that we will be moving from projected enrollments to actuals. He said that the projected growth pattern for TCC is approximately where it was predicted to be four years ago. We need to convince the state that we should be funded for the services we are providing to the community.

Bob Thornburg reported a meeting early next week to finalize the summer schedule. There will be approximately 1,050 FTE's built into the schedule; 150 sections carrying FTE's will be "yellow lined" for opening if necessary. Worksheets are due in Doreen Amoroso's office by February 2.

4. Annual Schedule -- Dr. Rhule said that an annual schedule is planned for next year. It is expected that we will be able to project a schedule based on the growth factor. Dr. Rhule said he would like to have the 1976-77 schedule completed by the last day of school. A biennial catalog is planned for 1977-79.
5. Budget Matters -- Dr. Rhule announced that we have not as yet developed an allocation vs. the expenditure pattern. A new budget development process will be presented in the near future. Every effort will be made to develop a budget formula based upon FTE served and divisional needs.
6. Catalog -- Dr. Rhule reported that the catalog is well under way. He explained some of the changes which should make it easier for faculty and incoming students to use the catalog.

7. Computer Assisted Instruction -- It was reported that several had attended the PLATO Computer Assisted Instruction Workshop at Edmonds Community College. A number were impressed, but all were overwhelmed with the cost.
8. Equipment, Printing and Supplies -- Dr. Rhule explained that it will be at least another week before definite figures are available.
9. Enrollment Report -- It was reported that winter quarter has 3,845 FTE's.

New Business

1. Change of Credits -- Math 114, from 3 to 4 (Elementary Computer Programming).

MOTION: It was moved by Ron Magden and seconded by Russ Clark that credits be changed from 3 to 4 for Math 114. After discussion, the motion carried.

Bob Rhule said that all courses and course changes will be presented as information items to the Board of Trustees at the February 26 meeting. He asked that division chairpersons be there to respond to any questions.

2. New Course Proposal -- Philosophy 200 (5 credits) Oriental Philosophy (Distribution: Humanities) To be offered fall quarter; no course prerequisites. Catalog Description: Examination of major philosophies and philosophers that have shaped the mind of the Oriental. Special attention is given to Confucianism, Legalism, Taoism, Buddhism, particularly Zen Buddhism. (Cost: Text - \$10)

MOTION: It was moved by Lloyd Berntson and seconded by Bob Thornburg that Philosophy 200 - Oriental Philosophy - be approved for recommendation to the Instructional Council. After discussion, the motion carried.

3. Contact Hour Change -- Music 140/240 (Concert Band) from 1 credit, 1 contact to 1 credit, 2 contacts --
4. Change of Credits and Contact Hours -- Music 171/271 (Jazz Workshop Band) from 1 to 2 credits (one lecture and four contact hours) --

Dave Whisner explained that these courses will be moving into the daytime area for rehearsals, per student demand. Concern was expressed about the increase in contact hours in Music 171/271.

MOTION: It was moved by Lloyd Berntson and seconded by Russ Clark that Music 140/240 and Music 171/271 be sent back for study, with recommendations to the next Executive Committee meeting. The motion carried.

5. Usage of Dial Access -- Doreen Amoroso announced that Don Gangnes, Nick Huddleston and she will meet at Tenzler Library on February 6 regarding Dial Access (touch-tone phone system). They will examine whether it is economically feasible to look for some kind of grant funding to see if Tenzler can be expanded so that four agencies can use it to reach the community. She reported that Bellevue's CHESTER system is effective. Mrs. Amoroso said she would like some input as to what kinds of uses TCC can make of Dial Access, what kind of target audiences we should be trying to reach, and whether there should be credit or not. Part of the problem is that only a portion of the community has touch-tone phones. It was noted that federal funds are available for disadvantaged people. It was explained that with this system you may dial the program you want, 24 hours a day. It was further noted that TCC, in cooperation with Tenzler, is offering Journalism 209. Mrs. Amoroso will report on this again at the next Executive Committee meeting.

Other

1. Bob Rhule asked that administrators alert appropriate department chairpersons if they are teaching in their department.
2. The calendar for 1976-77 has been discussed with the College Council. The proposed calendar starts with summer of 1976 and runs through summer, 1977.

The meeting adjourned at 4:05 p.m. The next meeting of the Executive Committee of the Instructional Council will be Tuesday, February 3, at 2:30 p.m. in the Library Conference Room.
