If it is plain to the average student that this floor must be protected and the only way to protect it is to have sock dances, I would observe that student government and Activities Council had best "get on the stick" and form rules and enforce them in order to continue to provide a half decent playing court and dancing surface.

Freshman Amendments Pass

The freshman class of Tacoma Community College held their first organized meeting on Friday, Nov. 10.

The meeting, presided over by freshman class President Aaron Bobo, was called to vote upon four proposed amendments to the freshman constitution.

The first order of business was amending Article VIII, Section 2 so that a "quorum shall consist of 40 members of the freshman class." At the time the constitution read that "a quorum shall consist of five (5) per cent of the freshman class." This was passed by a majority vote.

Article IV, Section 4 was amended to read that "the president, vice president, secretarytreasurer and four representatives of this organization shall each serve from the first day following the final elections until the last day of the spring quarter." This is a change from the way it read, which was that the elected officers would take office on the first day of November.

Article V, Section 1B was amended to add the words "and responsibilities" to the section. The amended section now reads that "the vice president shall assume all the duties and responsibilities of the president in his absence. He shall further organize and promote social activities sponsored by the freshman class.

'This constitution may be amended by a simple majority of the freshman class present at

the freshman class meeting" is how Article XII, Section 1 now reads after being amended from reading "this constitution may be amended by a simple majority of the freshman class."

A new section that was to be added to Article XII under Section 2. which stated that "amend ments of the freshman class must be posted and announced two weeks in advance of meetings before voting can take place," was defeated.

In later action, President Aaron Bobo appointed James Hendershot to act as class parliamentarian.

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

TCC Sport Car Club Slates First Autocross for Nov. 26

Chevy owners are you tired of taking heat from those little sports car buffs? Then come out Nov. 26 and prove who's best.

The Sports Car Club will hold its first auto-cross on Sunday at 12 noon. The event will take place at the Tacoma Community College parking lot. All types of cars are encouraged to participate. An entrance fee of \$1.50 will be charged to cover expenses.

Drivers should register no later than 11 a.m., giving enough time for a course walk-through and safety inspection. All cars entering must have a standard approved seat belt and proof of the car's ability to come to a quick stop. The safety check will include a check of the tires, steering, and brake system.

Cars will be classified by Sports Car Club of America regulations.

The classification is made by engine size and car weight. Similar classes will be grouped if not enough cars show up to represent that class. The cars' classifications and numbers will be given at the time of inspection. American cars will be placed in a sedan class.

The course will begin from a dead start, with several hairpin turns, a crisscross, at least one 360° turn, and end with a complete stop within one car length.

Trophies will be awarded to all class winners, and there will be an award for the fastest overall time. There will also be an award from the club for the slowest time, and possibly a letter of commendation from the State Patrol for safe driving.

Later in the day, spectators will be allowed to mingle in the pits with the drivers, and observe the machines at close hand.

Head coach Ed Fisher of Tacoma praised the squad for their efforts in the meet which was their best showing in state action since the school began participating in the sport last year.

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
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Biology instructor William Shapeero prepares fried squid as future homemakers look on.



Biology Lab. **Eats Fried Squid**

"I made squid chowder at home during the weekend," stated Mr. William Shapeero, biology instructor at Tacoma Community College. "However, my wife has hardly talked to me since."

This comment was made by Mr. Shapeero during a morning biology laboratory session while he prepared fried squid for his lab students. Mr. Shapeero explains the benefits of various seafoods that many people would not consider edible every year to his students and also demonstrates his culinary skills.

Marine biologist Shapeero invited the female portion of his class to observe him while he prepared the mid-morning snack. When he announced that "breakfast is served," all the observers immediately returned to their desks.

Shapeero explained that there are many ways to prepare the squid for consumption. The best way is to cook it fast over a hot fire. If it is cooked slow it becomes rubbery.

Mr. Richard Perkins, another biology instructor, happened in and commented that it would have tasted better if it had been "batter dipped." While Mr. Shapeero had his back turned, Mr. Perkins walked away with the last four pieces of fried squid and a bottle of catsup.
