COMMUNITY SERVICE CLASSOFFERED AT POINT DEFIANCE

Kids, animals and course work will be linked during a spring quarter TCC community service class called "Animals in Action."

The course, for the whole family, will meet April 16 and April 30. Both of the Saturday sessions, will be taught by TCC biology instructor Dick Perkins and director of the Pt. Defiance aquarium Dr. George Blanks.

The class will meet at the Pt. Defiance aquarium and zoo to observe animals and aquatic life. Slide presentations, group discussion and observation will highlight the ways in which animals live and survive.

Hours of the sessions are from 9 a.m. to noon and from 1 to 4 p.m. Youngsters must be first graders or older and accompanied by a parent or guardian. Cost is \$15 per person, \$30 for a family of 3 or more.

POISON PREVENTION FEATUREDIN WORKSHOP

Staying clear of the tragedy of accidental poisoning will be discussed Tuesday, April 12, starting at 7 p.m. in Bldg. 18-11.

Speaker will be Joyce Jackson, consumer specialist for the Washington State Department of Agriculture.

Her topics during the free session include the poison prevention packaging act designed primarily for children under five, types of household items most commonly linked to accidental poisoning, and what to do if poisoning occurs.

VOCATIONAL TEACHER EDUCATION

MAJORS

The Washington Vocational Association Memorial Teacher Education Scholarship provides the recipient with \$300, \$100 for each academic quarter or \$150 for each academic semester in which the recipient is enrolled full-time at an institution of higher education in the state of Washington

It is the purpose of this scholarship to provide financial assistance as a reward to qualified individuals for excellence in leadership, potential to learn and some need for financial assistance.

1. The recipient must have completed a minimum of 90 quarter credits prior to receipt of the scholarship and must indicate intentions to enroll or be enrolled in a curriculum or program leading to a Bachelor's degree and certification as a vocational instructor under the Washington State Plan for Vocational Education.

2. The recipient must have and maintain an accumulative grade point average of 2.60 or better.

3. The awarding of the scholarship will be done by a selection committee composed of 3 persons representing vocational education as appointed by the WVA Executive Board.

4. The deadline for application for the scholarship will be June 1 of the year the scholarship is to be awarded.

5. All applicants must write a short statement (not to exceed one typed single spaced page) indicating why he or she intends to go into the field of vocational teaching.

6. Applications for the scholarship must be sent to the Executive Secretary of the WVA to be awarded by him/her to the Scholarship Committee chairperson.

7. The recipient of the scholarship will be announced in the memory of vocational teachers at the annual WVA conference.

8. All applicants must have a minimum of two (2) statements in writing from persons (other than family) who are qualified to write concerning character reference, ability and possibility of success as a vocational teacher.

9. Selection of the recipient will be based on: (a) potential as a vocational teacher, (b) demonstration of leadership characteristics, (c) financial need.

10. One (1) alternate individual will be identified and be awarded the Washington Teacher Education Scholarship in the event that the primary recipient does not return to college or fails to maintain proper GPA.

HEW TABULATES ENROLLMENT DROP

A memo from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare indicates several aspects of the nationwide enrollment drop in postsecondary educational institutions:

Comparison of the estimated enrollment figures for fall 1976 with final figures for fall 1975 shows that (1) there was a slight drop in overall enrollment, (2) enrollment in public institutions declined, while increasing in private institutions, (3) enrollment of men decreased while enrollment of women increased, and (4) enrollment of first-time freshmen increased substantially--spectacularly in private universities and other 4-year institutions.

On November 9, 1976, the National Center for Education Statistics released preliminary estimates of 1976 fall enrollment in institutions of higher education based on a selected sample of institutions. The estimated total enrollment for all institutions showed a probable increase of 0.4 percent over fall 1975.

The 1976 enrollment figures are based on responses from all but a few of the institutional units (3074) in the higher education universe. Enrollment for all institutions is estimated to be sufficiently less than the comparable estimate based on the sample to account for a drop in overall enrollment of 0.7.

Additional information from the same survey is available in three forms:

(1) A copy of the computer tape providing data on total full-time and part-time enrollment by sex and total first-time enrollment for individual institutions of higher education in the United States may be purchased.

(2) The data on the computer tape^P mentioned above are also incorporated into the EDSTAT online educational information access system operated by NCES. This system can be entered through modestly priced keyboard terminals anywhere in the United States. Enrollment data by institution for fall 1976 may be compared with those for previous years and related to data on finances, degrees and other institutional characteristics.

(3) Printouts are available listing the selected enrollment items in this report for individual institutions.
