Grants support three types of activities:

- 1. <u>Pilot projects</u>. The design and treatment of new methods or materials.
- 2. <u>Developmental efforts</u>. Attempts to perfect, expand upon, or disseminate materials or methods of recognized merit.
- 3. <u>Studies</u>. Examination or analysis of practices, trends and developments in higher education, and other investigations having direct practical value for institutions of higher learning.

Projects must have broad applicability, be effective and efficient and self-perpetuating after funding expires.

General Education Advisory Committee

Summary of Meeting December 15, 1975

On invitation, Dr. Stevens joined the General Education Advisory Committee to share concerns, both philosophical and functional, regarding Tacoma Community College's General Education Program. Points emphasized in the discussion include the following:

- There is need for examination of concepts and clarification of terms regarding general education, developmental education, and remedial education as applicable to TCC.
- A rationale should be developed as a basis for program components.
- Development of student profiles (identified by Allan Clarke as one of his major goals) is critical as a basis for systematically effective advising, placement, and curriculum development.
- Control over placement and movement of students through systematically effective screening and advising (also identified by Allan Clarke as major goals) is essential to instructional effectiveness.
- Students enrolling in evening classes, as well as those enrolling in daytime classes, need systematic screening and advising services.
- 6. An adequate curriculum for the majority of students deficient in basic skills requires a well articulated program of two or three quarters of concentrated skill development augmented by general education courses at appropriate functional levels. For such students, well articulated guidance and counseling services are particularly critical.
- As a basis for planning, a survey should be made of past and current TCC curricular and service elements which have proven successful. We should build upon these.
- Realistic planning requires establishment of priorities and effective utilization of existing curriculum with essential modifications.

At the close of the discussion, it was decided that Doreen Amoroso, advised by Carolyn Simonson, should appoint two working sub-committees, one on screening and advising and one on curriculum, to assess past and current strengths and develop information and recommendations for consideration by the total committee. The specific purpose of the screening/advising sub-committee is to provide information useful to Allen Clarke in planning an expanded student advisory program.

It was further decided to postpone addressing problems of terminology until the two sub-committees have completed their work, hopefully before the end of January. The next General Education Advisory Committee meeting will be scheduled when one or both sub-committees are ready to report.

Dear Mr. Rhule:

Recently you received a letter from the Public Disclosure Commission telling you of results of an inquiry made of state agencies by the Commission about compliance with the state's Open Government Law. In that letter particular attention was given to the provisions of the law which prohibit any agency from giving, selling, or providing access to lists of individuals requested for commercial purposes unless specifically authorized or directed by law (RCW 42.17.260(5)).

I share the Commission's view that this prohibition includes employees of agencies as well as clients of agencies, and that providing access to any lists of employees could be basis for legal actions against the agency.

The Attorney General, particularly through ACO 1974 No. 15, has attempted to give some guidance to the meaning and scope of the above-cited provision. That opinion, in part, says the intent of the law is to "prohibit an agency covered by the law from supplying the names of natural persons in list form when the person requesting such information from the public records of the agency intends to use it to contact or in some way personally affect the individuals identified on the list and when the purpose of the contact would be to facilitate that person's commercial activities".

I believe this means that agencies shall not give, sell, or provide access to lists of employees when information on those lists could in some way appear in city directories or other similar publications which are sold or intended to be used by someone else to facilitate commercial activities.

Please see that each and every employee of your agency is made aware of these provisions of the law and that procedures exist in your agency whereby all requests for lists of individuals are reviewed by the agency's designated Records Officer and/or by you personally.
