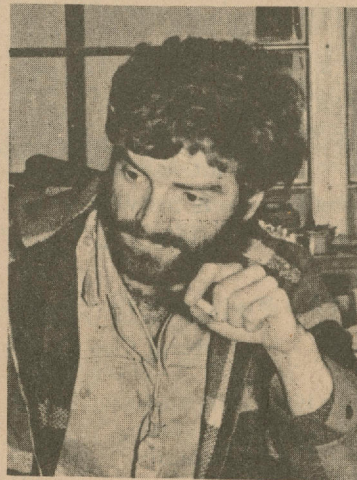
The highlight of the evening will be the crowning of the AWS Royalty during the band's intermission.

"The date was changed," said Activities Co-ordinator Miss Paula Eisenman, "because student government felt that the student body had not been given adequate notice of election dates, qualifications and procedures."

Associated Women Students elections, which are normally held in conjunction with student body elections, will be held on the first proposed date for the primaries of May 1, and final election Wednesday, May 8.

So far, for each student body office, only one candidate has filed. Five students have filed for the four positions of Sophomore Class Representative.

Freshman Class Representative Cass Stegman failed to get a required two-thirds vote at last Thursday's GASTCC meeting to change the 2.0 grade requirement of would-be candidates to 1.8, and requiring that he or she must have a 2.0 grade point at the time of assuming office next year. Kelly Halligan, Sophomore Class Vice-President, failed to persuade student government to reconsider Miss Stegman's motion.

Petitions are still available in the student government office in Building 6. Petitions must contain the signatures of 25 full-time students of Tacoma Community College and are due in the Activities Co-ordinator's office May 9.

A candidates meeting, which is designed to inform candidates as to the election rules and pro-

cedures, will be held Friday, May 10 and campaign speeches will begin May 13, with primary elections being held Wednesday, May 17. Speeches for the final elections will be held May 20.

Last Tuesday, several members of Mr. Morris Summers' acting class presented a play, "Fences," for the Wainwright Elementary School P.T.A.

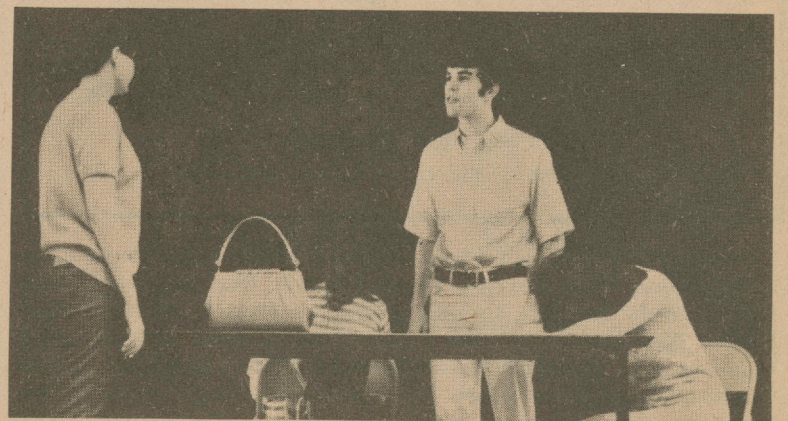

of the Political Science Forum, that all the articles appeared on page 9 or 10 of your paper.

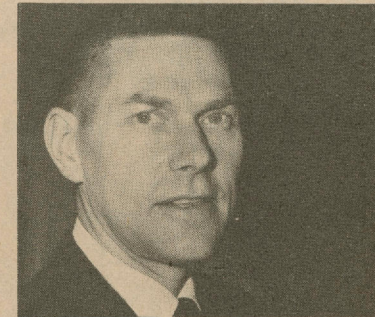

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# Highline To Host TCC Trackmen

## Tacoma Takes Second Place; Distanceman Hayes Wins Two

Tacoma Community College will travel to Highline Saturday to compete in the Highline Invitational Track Meet. Among the teams competing will be the Oregon State Rooks and host team Highline. The meet will start at 1:30 p.m. at the Highline High School track.

Distanceman John Hayes led the Titan trackmen to their second place at Yakima last Saturday. Hayes won the mile with a clocking of 4:23.5 and took the two-mile with a time of 9:49.3.

Team scoring ended with Yakima compiling 83 points, Tacoma 59, Lower Columbia 27 and Skagit 15.

Other first place finishers for the Titans were John Hayes in the 880 with a time of 2:00.4; Mike Greer's pole vault victory with a 13 foot vault and Gary Vandegrift's 50.2 time in the 440.

Ed Miller also ran to a win in the 330 intermediate hurdles, while the mile relay team of Hayes, Miller, Page and Vandegrift remained unbeaten in conference action with a 3:30.4 time.

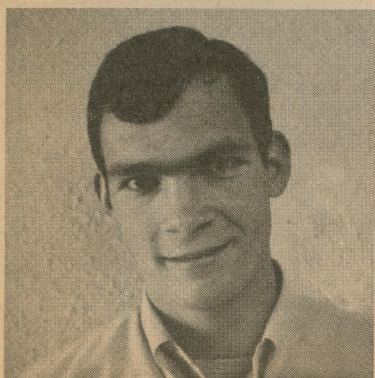
"The Everett team shot very well on their home course with two men sharing match medalist honors with a one under par-71," said Tacoma coach Robert Dezell.

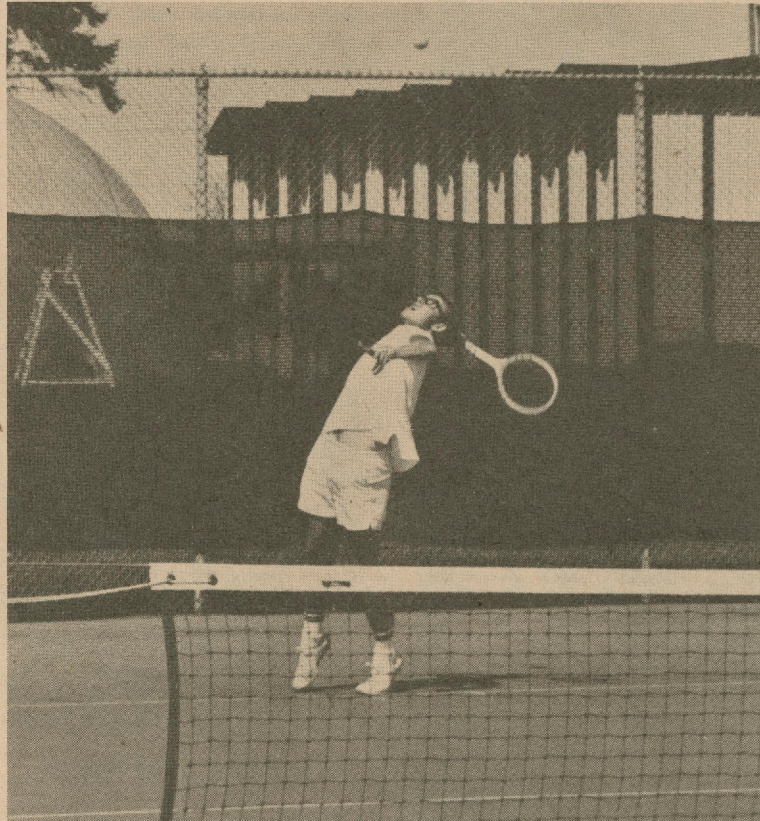

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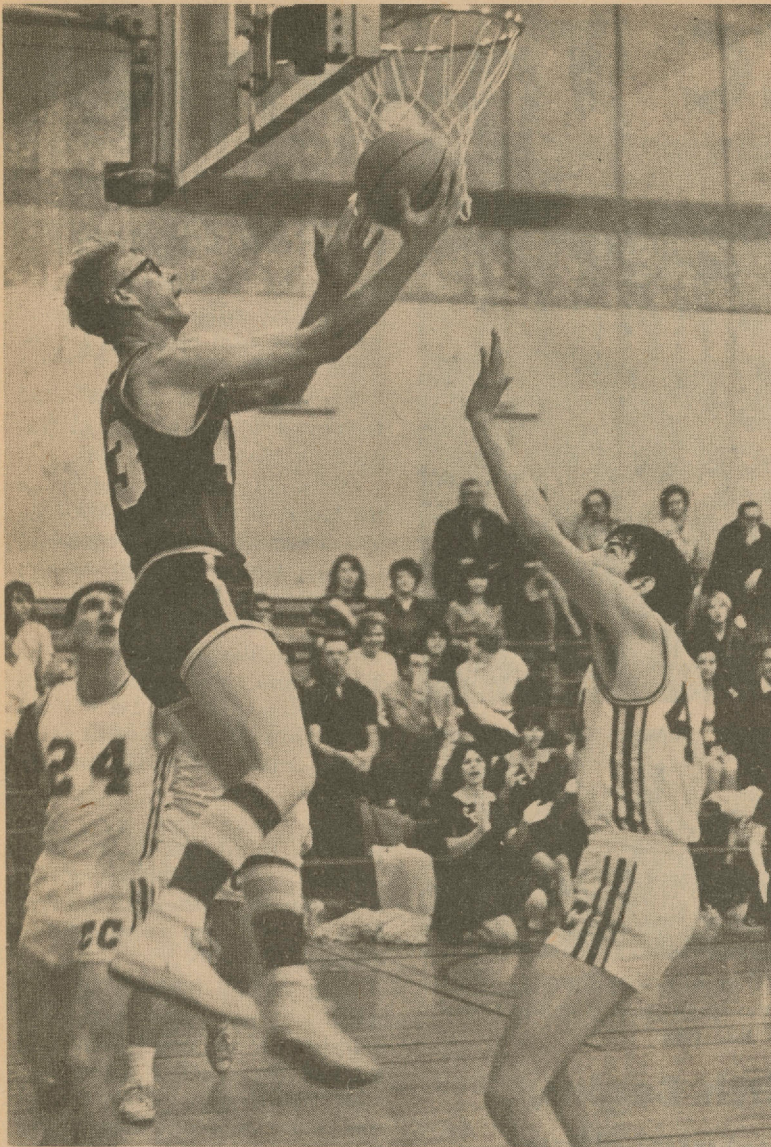
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Forward Don Lehman leaps high to shoot the ball in action last season. The Titan hoopster won three out of four awards at the team banquet Monday night.

Titan Forward Don Lehmen collected three out of four team awards Wednesday evening at the basketball banquet held in honor of the 1967-68 Tacoma Community College sage squad.

The team's leading scorer with a 17.9 average during the season, Lehman was awarded the trophy for "Most Valuable Player" by Coaches Don Moseid and Jim Savitz, and also won acclaim from his teammates. He was elected "Team Captain" and "Inspirational Player" by a vote from fellow players.

Coach Moseid pointed out the team's improvement in the second half of the season. The team had a 3-7 record on January 13 and went on to win 11 out of the remaining 15 games.

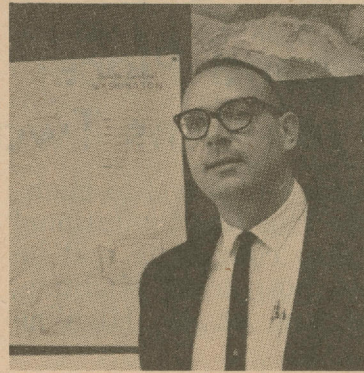

# 'Mt. St. Helen May Erupt'; Hyde

"It's true," Jack Hyde, TCC geology instructor said, "Mt. St. Helens could erupt again some time. It is the most likely of the Cascade Volcanoes to erupt, but most volcanoes could erupt at anytime."

Hyde explained that 9,677 foot Mt. St. Helens, located 40 miles north of Portland and 40 miles west of Tacoma, is the youngest of Washington State volcanoes. Its last eruption was recorded by explorer Gen. John C. Fremont in 1845. Ash from that eruption fell as far way as The Dalles, Ore. Ash can also be found mixed with the peat at South 19th and Mullen Sts. in Tacoma.

These and other facts of Washington geological history are brought out in a community services non-credit course which Hyde teaches each Wednesday night from 7-9 p.m. 26 adults are enrolled this quarter; 30 took

ing SDS should first find out what the group stands for. part in the studies winter quarter.

Hyde is especially interested in Mt. St. Helens as he has received a research grant from The Society of Sigma Xi to study the recent geologic history of the mountain. In the summer of 1967, he and his family, (wife Jacque, and now 18 month old

daughter, Laura) spent about 30 days on the mountain. This summer they plan to spend about 60 days.

The response to the course on Washington State Geology has caused the geology staff to consider a second course for spring, 1969, perhaps in identifying rocks and minerals. Washington State Geology will be offered again either fall or winter, 1968-69, he said.

Other community services non-credit courses offered at TCC include astronomy, the philosophy of Hugh Hefner, African culture and business law.
