POSSIBILITY OF STATE COLLEGE

CLOSURES SEEN

One or more state four-year college may be closed during the next decade because of declining enrollments, said the president of the University of Washington.

Dr. John R. Hogness did not call for such closures, but said plummeting enrollments are an "issue people don't want to face" but must. Hogness made the remarks before the university's faculty senate.

Hogness said the higher education enrollment problem "is the most significant issue that we will be confronting in the next 10 years." Closing colleges is one of the options available to solve the problem, he said.

University of Washington enrollment could decrease by 4,500 students by the mid-1980s and almost 350 faculty members would be cut, he said.

The university's enrollment now is 35,227 students.

Hogness said there will be 10,000 fewer graduates coming out of state high schools in 1984 than this year. Also, fewer students are pursuing higher education and there has been a decline in veteran enrollment.

Community college transfers to four-year institutions have been constant since 1973 and a continuation of the rapid increase in women enrollees is also unlikely, he said.

Old Business

1. New Course Adoption: Real Estate 245* (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab) - Economics and Environmental Issues of Real Estate (Prerequisite: Real Estate 150 or permission of instructor.) To be offered Winter Quarter 1978.

MOTION: It was moved by Jack Heinrick and seconded by Lorraine Stephan that Real Estate 245* be adopted into the college curriculum. The motion passed unanimously.

2. New Course Adoption: Respiratory Therapy Technology 144 - Respiratory Therapy Practicum (5 credits). To be offered Summer 1977. Associate Degree Distribution: Occupational.

MOTION: It was moved by Ron Magden and seconded by Ed McNeal that Respiratory Therapy Technology 144 be approved for adoption into the college curriculum. The motion passed unanimously.

3. Pilot and Experimental Course Adoption: Social Service 235 - Seminar on Volunteer Programs Management III (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab).

MOTION: It was moved by Dave Whisner and seconded by Doreen Amoroso that Social Service 235 be approved for adoption into the curriculum on an experimental basis, to be offered as needed. The motion carried unanimously.

4. Course Deletion: Geology 210 - Environmental Geology. To be replaced by Oceanography 102 - The Ocean World.

This course deletion request had been tabled at Dr. Hyde's request.

MOTION: It was moved by Ron Magden and seconded by Jack Hyde that Geology 210 be deleted from the college curriculum. The motion carried.

New Business

1. New Course Adoption: English 80 - Grammar Review (1 cr/0 lec/2 lab). To be offered Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer; Associate Degree Distribution: Other.
2. New Course Adoption: English 81 - Sentence Structure Review (1 cr/0 lec/2 lab). To be offered Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer; Associate Degree Distribution: Other.
3. English 82 - Punctuation Review (1 cr/0 lec/2 lab). To be offered Fall, Winter, Spring, Summer; Associate Degree Distribution: Other.

Carolyn Simonson described the proposed courses as sequential. She expressed a deep need for these courses. Students may enroll during scheduled registration or at any time during the first three weeks of the quarter. The workshop series will be individualized. Students can expect to spend about 15 hours in lab to complete each workshop course. Courses are designed for transfer students who have deficiencies.

4. New Course Adoption: English 234 - Introduction to Mythology and Folk Stories (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab). To be offered occasionally. Associate Degree Distribution: Humanities
Lloyd Berntson explained that the course is a study of myths and folk tales as they have affected, and still affect, our literature and culture. Emphasis will be on Western European myths and related folk tales.
5. Pilot and Experimental Course Adoption: History 199 - The American Labor Movement Today (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab). Associate Degree Distribution: Social Science. To be offered Spring Quarter.
Dr. Ronald Magden said the proposed experimental course was at the request of students presently taking History 198. The course examines the impact of the economy on labor, problems of union organization, minority participation in the labor movement, and the international implications of American labor policy.
6. New Course Adoption: Physical Education 130M - Handball (1 cr/0 lec/0 lab). To be offered Fall Quarter. Associate Degree Distribution: Physical Education.
7. New Course Adoption: Physical Education 131 - Racquetball (1 cr/0 lec/0 lab). To be offered Fall Quarter. Associate Degree Distribution: Physical Education.

Jack Heinrick said the proposed physical education activity courses will not be possible because of facilities available in the new YMCA. Mr. Heinrick said that he had worked out tentative arrangements so that TCC can use their facilities during the day.

Other

1. Dr. Rhule said he would like the divisions and departments to update the present curriculum files spring quarter. Forms are available from Pat Loth (5022).
2. Dr. Rhule announced that there will be an effectiveness study of the curriculum which will be transmitted to the Board of Trustees. Prior to transmittal it will be shared with the departments and divisions.
3. Faculty handbooks will be prepared for next fall. Doreen Amoroso is coordinating the effort.
4. Dr. Rhule stressed the importance of the decisions of the Curriculum Committee and encouraged members to express their opinions freely to this body.
5. Ron Magden thanked Elijah Hankerson and Harland Malyon for their efforts to make "Roots" a very successful course. There are over 100 persons enrolled.

The meeting adjourned at 4:15 p.m. The next meeting of the Curriculum Committee will be held on Wednesday, February 16, at 2:45 p.m., in Building 1, Room 12.

The meeting was called to order by Dr. Robert R. Rhule at 3:40 p.m., in the Reading Room of the Resource Center.

III. Admissions and Standards Committee

Dr. Rhule distributed a faculty handout regarding the Admissions and Standards Committee whose membership will be one counselor, four instructional staff members, one Learning Assistance Program representative, and the Associate Dean for Admissions and Records.

The committee's function is to review admission policies, procedures, and academic standards, to review applications for admissions or re-admissions, and to make appropriate recommendations for acceptance or rejection. The committee is being enpaneled because students on scholastic probation either fail to receive attention, are lost to the college, or continue to remain on probation with little chance of attaining the 2.00 grade point average necessary to receiving an Associate Degree.

IV. Revised Veteran Student Reporting Requirements

Dr. Batdorf explained the new attendance reporting which will put the burden upon the veteran/student. Steve Howard distributed the Veterans' Attendance/Progress Verification Cards that students will have the instructors sign to certify class attendance. Reports are to be signed every three weeks. Mr. Howard explained the impact of I's or W's on the VA benefits. Dr. Batdorf requested that the faculty advise veterans in their classes that it is to their advantage to make up classes in which they receive an "I" or "W".

V. Winter Quarter Enrollment Information

Al Clarke reported the following information:

Fall 1975 - 4260 FTEs enrolled	Winter 1976 - 3860 FTEs enrolled
Fall 1976 - 3750 FTEs enrolled	Winter 1977 - 3400 FTEs enrolled (approximately)

He explained that there is a 9 percent drop between Fall and Winter Quarters of both years. He also said that when the final count comes in we will have more than 3400 FTEs for Winter 1977.

VI. Report to the Faculty

After thanking Pam Huddleston for allowing the group to meet in the Library, Dr. Stevens addressed the faculty on matters contained in his written quarterly report to the faculty.

He stated that he feels that the Legislature will act on higher education tuition and fees this year. He asked that each faculty member read the report so that any questions it raised might be brought to the intra-divisional meetings which are scheduled. Dr. Stevens deferred any discussion on major problems and issues in both public and private sectors in higher education until the instructional divisional meetings.

VII. Institutional Goals Inventory

Dr. Stevens invited the faculty to participate in filling out the Institutional Goal Inventory opinionnaire at a later time; results will be recorded and shared with the faculty. Dr. Stevens briefly discussed potential funding of the community college system. He encouraged faculty to review a report on population trends which is available in his office.

Jerry McCourt, President of the TCCFT, asked for the floor to conduct some brief business.

After the business was conducted, Dr. Stevens adjourned the meeting at 4:15 p.m.
