RON POWELL NAMED WREEF

BOARD TRUSTEE

Ron Powell, real estate program coordinator/instructor attended the Washington Association of Realtors Educational Conference and Licensing Division Commission meetings in Spokane Sept. 22-25.

At this conference, Powell was selected by the Washington Real Estate Educational Foundation to serve as a board trustee, representing all 23 community colleges in Washington.

WREEF is a non-profit organization which helped start real estate education in Washington. It distributes several scholarships annually.

The organization recently compiled a research and development program to find new ways of teaching new subjects to real estate professionals.

TACOMA COMMUNITY COLLEGE Faculty Meeting September 14, 1976

Dr. Stevens welcomed the faculty at its first meeting for the year. He introduced Dr. Richard Batdorf, Dean of Student Services, and mentioned other changes on campus -- Paula Pascoe has been named Assistant to the Dean of Student Services, and Jack Hyde is Acting Mathematics and Science Division Chairperson. He asked that faculty members read the weekly bulletin and contribute information to it by calling Eve Dumovich (5018).

Dr. Rhule also welcomed the faculty and introduced Donald Poulson, Mathematics Department Chairman at Mesa Community College. He is exchanging duties with Joe Betz, who is at Mesa Community College for Fall Quarter. Others welcomed back from sabbatical or personal leaves were Keith Brightwell, Karen Becker, Dr. Yun-yi Ho, and Ken Gentili.

A slide show, prepared by campus personnel to orient new students to the college and its services, was shown.

Dr. Richard Batdorf addressed the faculty. He explained the problems entailed with veterans' attendance and told the faculty of pending assessments in the amount of \$68,000. He stressed the importance of ending the practice of a "W" without the withdrawal date showing and the reporting of non-attending students. He stated that the reporting cycle for non-attending or failing veterans has been cut to 30 days.

Dr. Batdorf explained his service goals for both students and staff at TCC. He said much of the counseling would be consolidated in the lobby of the Resource Center. He also voiced concern for an effective probation system for students who drop below a 2.00 G.P.A. or who do not complete at least half of the units attempted.

Dr. Batdorf announced that he would also like to determine how many of our students leave the institution prematurely because their educational objectives have been satisfield and how many leave because of dissatisfaction. He said he would be working with, and calling upon, the faculty for help in these and many other areas.

Nominations for three faculty College Council representatives from the faculty were asked for by Dr. Rhule. Ivonna McCabe recommended that each division submit names to the Dean of Instruction and that a ballot be prepared and sent to the faculty. Since there were no objections, Dr. Rhule accepted that procedure.

Announcements

- Dr. Rhule commented on the Curriculum Committee and its membership. The first meeting will be on October 6 at 3 p.m., in the John Binns Room.
- He announced that Ed McNeal had been elected Department Chairman of the Physical Sciences.
- Ed Zimmerman commented on the computer workshops to be held this week and invited the faculty to attend.

The meeting adjourned at 10:07 a.m.
