Edmunds handed over the <u>chairman's gavel to Frank E. Cooper</u> after the board elected Cooper chairman on April 25. Cooper promtply reached into his pocket and handed Edmunds a gavel as a souvenir. Cooper also presented Edmunds with a certificate recognizing his service as chairman, signed by the other four board members.

The <u>Arts and Science Club of Tacoma</u> has made a substantial contribution to TCC's revolving student loan fund. <u>Mrs. Irving Broxson</u> has donated close to 100 rhododendron and camellia plants for the campus in memory of her late husband. Contributions for the McNeil Island Scholarship Fund have been received from <u>H. S.</u> Vanderwarker, Julia E. Frank and the Washington State Retired Teachers Association.

Irving Clark Jr., Seattle attorney and radio personality, will be the speaker when TCC holds its third commencement exercises June 7 in the Physical Education Building. Clark, who has conducted a radio phone-in talk show since 1964, is a former member of the State Highway Commission.

TCC is one of four colleges in the state that will participate next year in the <u>New Careers</u> <u>Program</u>--aimed at helping the poor people overcome educational handicaps and acquire the college education they need to become professionals. Plans call for a program to serve 25 participants, who will attend classes at TCC and work for public agencies. The State Office of Economic Opportunity is administering the program.

Many veterans of military service are planning to continue their education after discharge, and TCC is offering to send a packet of material about the college to servicemen.
