Ready or not, here comes '72

And when new calendars go up on the wall, it's time to start the winter quarter at TCC. Starting the week of Jan. 17, a line-up of 54 non-credit community service classes will be offered, with something for just about everyone. Registration for these one-night-a-week classes is scheduled for the week of Jan. 10-14. If transactional analysis, meditation and self-realization don't turn you on, how about beginning ceramics, acrylics or macrame? Or how about investments: stocks and bonds, the art of stock market speculation or real estate investment in income-producing property? If you want to learn a language, beginning classes in French, Swedish, Norwegian, German and Italian will be offered. The complete list will appear in the Jan. 3 News Tribune.

Registration for credit classes is scheduled for Jan. 3. More than 2,100 currently enrolled TCC students have already signed up winter-quarter classes, which start Jan. 4. The winter quarter schedule contains more than 240 different credit courses, including 66 offered during late afternoon and evening hours. Registration appointments can be obtained from the TCC Records Office in Building 6 through Dec. 17.

Winter quarter classes in TCC's new adult high school completion program will begin the week of Jan. 10. Classes will include English, social studies and science. Registration will continue through Dec. 17 and will reopen Dec. 3-7. The adult education office in Building 7 will be open from 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. Fridays. Robert C. Thornburg, coordinator, said more than 100 persons enrolled in the individualized program during its initial quarter.
