Also speaking will be Joan Royce, TCC chairman of the allied health division, and Marilyn Becker, nursing class president.

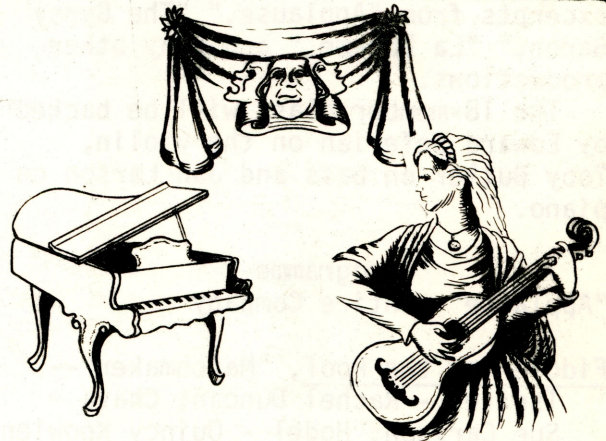
A reception will follow.

TCC STUDENT WINS STATE CHAMPIONSHIP IN LONG JUMP

TCC's Bob Blackburn retained the lead slot in the state with a long jump of 23 feet, eight and three-quarter inches during the Northwest Community College (State) Championship meet May 20 and 21 at Spokane Community College.

The administration of justice student kept the championship earned last year with only two jumps early in this year's meet.

Due to bad weather he pulled a leg muscle during the second jump. However, no other contestant competing was able to pass the distance Blackburn achieved, and he won the meet.

Blackburn also placed fifth in the 100 meter race, setting a new school record of 10.54.

His teammate Dwight Crocker placed fifth in the 10,000 meter race with 32 minutes and 46 seconds--also a school record.

The Titan tracksters earned a total of 14 points during the meet. Fourteen community colleges competed.

WSU OFFERS INTENSIVE JAPANESE STUDY THIS SUMMER

The Department of Foreign Languages and Literatures of Washington State University will institute an intensive Japanese language course this summer.

It will serve the needs of undergraduate students and broad sectors of graduate students. This course will also assist those who seek to expand and to enrich their cultural perspectives.

The class will meet seven hours a day for eight academic weeks, and each student will earn 10 hours of university credits.

Appropriately structured and self-paced, the class day will totally immerse the student in the Japanese language: in reading, writing, speaking and comprehending.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

Alan Vandever was elected vice-chairman of Tacoma Community College Board of Trustees at their regular monthly meeting Thursday, May 26.

Sally Starke was selected by the Board as their representative to the Trustees Association for Community Colleges. Ellen Pinto, Board chairman, was named alternate.

The Board also made a special presentation to the Reverend Elijah Hankerson, retiring after eight years of service to the college. Reverend Hankerson was instrumental in the development of the Black studies program.

Lloyd Berntson explained the English and communications division to the Board. He pointed out that the division served 4,700 students, and he talked about the screening and testing program, the ongoing curriculum and off-campus programs. He also introduced members of the English and communications staff to the Board and showed slides of students at work in various aspects of the program.

Dr. Robert Rhule, dean of instruction, presented the instructional services report. He said a recent letter indicated that the new course program for respiratory therapy technician will enable students to write the state exam and that an accreditation team recently visited the campus to evaluate the medical records program.

Dr. Rhule introduced Doreen Amoroso who introduced Lorraine Hildebrand, author of "Straw Hats, Sandals and Steel: The Chinese in Washington State." Mrs. Hildebrand presented the Board with a copy of her book.

"We are all very proud of you," Board Chairman Ellen Pinto told Mrs. Hildebrand, TCC reference librarian.

Pat Shuman, child care center coordinator, presented slides and a discussion about the child care center and introduced the center's teaching staff.

Don Gangnes, dean of business services and planning, told the Board that the campus signing project should be finished by September 1 and that the new floor of the cafeteria would be installed between quarters. He added that the budget development program for the coming years was on schedule.

Irish McKinney, outgoing Associated Student Body president, introduced the proposed student and activities fee budget for 1977-78 for study and review by the Board. The meeting was McKinney's last formal meeting as ASB president, and he introduced his successor, Dick Wright, to the Board.

Also lodged with the Board for study and review was the amendment to Board Policy, Chapter IV, Section 4.1051, regarding tuition refund policy and proposed college fee schedule.

Paula Pascoe, assistant to the dean of student services, was granted a professional leave for one year, provided the terms not exceed those mandated by Board Policy.

Mrs. Pinto commended those involved with the spring festival and announced that the next regular Board meeting would be June 23 at 2 p.m. in the Binns Room.

The meeting was called to order at 2:45 p.m., by Chairman Robert R. Rhule.

Old Business

1. New Course Adoption: History 92 - U. S. Civilization: 1865 to Present (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab) Associate Degree Distribution: ALA; ATA; High School Diploma (Tabled earlier)

MOTION: It was moved by Ron Magden and seconded by Bill Muse that History 92 be adopted into the college curriculum.

The motion carried unanimously.

2. Course Modification: Women's Studies 100 - Title Change - FROM: What About Woman? to Assertiveness Training (Tabled earlier)
Lee Morrison provided the rationale for the title change.

MOTION: It was moved by Dick Deyoe and seconded by Paul Michaels that Women's Studies' 100 title be changed to Assertiveness Training.

The motion carried unanimously.

New Business

1. Course Deletion: Medical Assistant 211 - Medical Assistant and the Law (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) (Replaced by Health Technology 225 - Legal Concepts for Health Occupations)
2. Course Deletion: Medical Assistant 231 - Clinical Procedures (3 cr/2 lec/2 lab) (Combined to Medical Assistant 230 with an increase in credits)
3. Course Modification: Medical Assistant 210 - Medical Orientation & Ethics (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) CREDIT CHANGE: To - 5 cr/5 lec/0 lab
4. Course Modification: Medical Assistant 230 - Examining Room Techniques (2 cr/1 lec/2 lab) CREDIT CHANGE: To - 5 cr/3 lec/4 lab
5. New Course Adoption: Health Technology 225 (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) - Legal Concepts for Health Occupations; To be offered Winter Quarter.

Joan Royce explained that Items 1 through 5 are "housekeeping" items which would delete two existing courses and increase the credit value for two. Medical Assistant 211 is being replaced by a new course, Health Technology 225; this course will become a part of the Medical Assistant program, as well as part of the Medical Records program, the Medical Secretary program and the Medical Transcriptionist program. This course will be transferrable to Seattle University, since they have a Medical Records Administration program and also a four-year Medical Records Administration Baccalaureate program.

6. New Course Adoption: Radiologic Technology 214 - Radiologic Anatomy (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) To be offered Fall Quarter.
7. New Course Adoption: Physics 110 (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) - Radiation Physics III; To be offered Fall Quarter.
8. New Course Adoption: Radiologic Technology 215 (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) - Radiologic Pathology; To be offered Winter Quarter.

Joan Royce explained that items 6, 7, 8 are new courses that have been asked for by the Radiologic Technology program Advisory Committee.

9. New Course Adoption: Optometric Technician 220 - (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab) - Optometric Technician Science I; To be offered Fall Quarter; 1978
10. New Course Adoption: Optometric Technician 221 - (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) - Optometric Technician Science II; To be offered Fall Quarter; 1978

Joan Royce explained items 9-16 as a new series of courses for an optometric technician program which has been approved by the State Board for Community College Education. There has been an Advisory Committee active for the past six months. Mrs. Royce further explained that some of the core courses are used in other Allied Health programs as well. She also said that the optometric technician Advisory Committee believes the program will grow tremendously in the next five years. There is a particular demand for technicians in nursing homes to make lens corrections.

Dr. Rhule said that there is only one program in the state at the present time - in Spokane, and it is his understanding that the program would be restricted to TCC and Spokane.

MOTION: Bill Packard moved that Items 1-20 be approved.

The motion was withdrawn after Dr. Rhule explained the need for study by members of the Curriculum Committee before action.

Keith Brightwell, instructor-coordinator of the Administration of Justice program, said that items 17-20 are necessary due to a major change in the thrust of the Administration of Justice program. The State of Washington has made training at the academy mandatory for all persons going into the field; therefore, Mr. Brightwell said that the courses: Introduction to Penology, Management of Police Operations, Criminal Justice Planning, and Juvenile Justice Systems are complementary to the academy program and needed by officers in the field. Mr. Brightwell said that he had talked with Washington State University, Central Washington State College, and the University of Puget Sound, and they have all assured him that the courses will be transferrable; however, he has asked that this be communicated to him in writing.
