There was a lot of joy in the penitentiary Wednesday night.

The watch tower was still there, and the locked gates, and the fencing. But even the guards wore smiles as the 27 TCC diplomas were delivered to inmates during special ceremonies in the penitentiary chapel.

Neatly pressed prison garb was covered by caps and gowns, and the academic procession was in full regalia.

Flowers from the prison gardens decorated the chapel platform.

The mood was set by a prisoner who sang "Somewhere Over the Rainbow" in a magnificent voice. And as each inmate walked forward to receive his diploma there were spontaneous bursts of applause.

Cries of "Right on!" and "All Right!" punctuated the the awards as certain candidates' names were called. Some walked forward several times to receive GED diplomas, vocational training and apprenticeship diplomas and a Bachelor's degree.

They had worked long and hard for the honor, and the hall was filled with family, friends and members of the TCC community.

Outside, afterwards, the graduates

and their supporters enjoyed a party. Access to the garden is only permitted on special occasions.

And this was indeed a special occasion.

For this was a graduation without cynicism, and with promise. It seemed that behind those walls at least 27 TCC students had begun to build a dream.

A dream of freedom "Over the Rainbow" where the skills they had acquired would keep them on the outside.

There was a lot of hope in the penitentiary Wednesday night.

## BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

The TCC Board of Trustees Thursday afternoon approved the adoption of the 1976-77 student budget.

The budget base of \$200,000 was determined by the number of FTE's projected plus augmentation from any cash balance left over from the current year. Adjustments will be made after the actual cash balance is determined, assuring that all funds will be accounted for.

The Board also approved chapter seven of the Board Policy Manual on college facilities and accepted chapter eight (business and finance) for study. Chapter seven divides the users of college facilities into two categories, basically those who would derive a financial benefit from use of the facility and those who would not, and assesses user fees accordingly.

During the Board meeting Mary Kennedy presented Board member Daniel Evans with his academic hood reflecting his degree in business administration from the University of Washington.

Dr. John Terrey presented Bob Arpke with a TCC plaque honoring his service to the college and also gave him a collection of graded compositions so that he "could remember" his years of service to the college. Arpke is retiring at the end of the quarter. Dr. Terrey was TCC's dean of instruction when Arpke was hired.

Next year's ASB president, Irish McKinney, read a statement drafted by this year's president, Mrs. Shelley Waller, which commended Arpke for his role as "an outstanding person and faculty member."

The statement mentioned Arpke's acceptance of appointment on the first service and activity fees budget advisory committee.

Karran Sloan presented Ellen Douthett to the Board as her representative for WFSE. Mrs. Sloan said she was leaving the college to become married.

The TCC slide presentation was also shown to the Board by Nick Huddleston, production manager of the project.

The Board authorized Dr. Larry Stevens to establish the College Council for 1976-77. The council will consist of three students, three faculty members, three members of the classified staff and five operational staff members. Dr. Stevens said the council will meet for the first time at the beginning of fall quarter.

Dr. Robert Rhule presented the curricula for the Medical Assistant Program and the Court and Conference Reporting Program. The Board was also informed of a \$24,832 grant for the continuation of the Human Service Worker Program at TCC funded by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, and the grant from the Washington Commission for the Humanities for the "Limits of Liberty" Bicentennial television-public debate project.

Don Gangnes listed capital development projects for 1976-77 for the Board, explaining that the list was derived after all operational areas of the campus submitted project requests.

The Board moved to allocate \$60,000 of Capital Minor Contingency funds for the projects listed.

## MEMORANDUM

Subject: Communications Workshop

The proposed two-day workshop for fifteen (15) city employees has just been completed. It was held on campus May 12 and 19 and was designed to help middle management and staff personnel improve their skill in making oral presentations in job related situations. Evaluations by the participants indicate the sessions were beneficial, and the city's Director of Training and Development has already expressed interest in future workshops.

I must bring to your attention, however, that the success of this effort was due in large part to the supporting services I received from the campus community. The people in community services, personnel, campus information, food services, library, audio-visual, and the model office all made important contributions.

I commend to you the work of two individuals in particular. Margaret Heaton not only met the demands placed upon her for extra typing and duplicating, but she willingly helped with many last minute details when the pressure was on. Nick Huddleston was also invaluable in providing a variety of media services and was available when I needed technical assistance.

As you know, organizations in both the public and private sectors are becoming more interested in tapping existing educational resources in the community, rather than developing costly training programs of their own. I hope the success of this cooperative effort will indicate to you the potential of this campus to adapt our traditionally academic resources to the contemporary training needs of the community.
