**WEST SIDE STORY
OPENS JULY 19
AT TCC**

Teen-age gang-warfare combined with a Romeo-Juliet love story in New York slums are themes of the TCC Summer Arts Workshop production of the musical drama "West Side Story."

One of the most brilliant successes on the New York and London stages during the late 1950's, the play will be presented July 19, 20, 21 and 25, 26, 27 and 28 in the TCC theater at 8 p.m.

Forty talented high school students from 14 Tacoma-Pierce County high schools are combining talents to present this play as the second annual "Summer Arts Workshop." The workshop is sponsored by TCC and the Tacoma Exchange Club.

West Side Story is a rapturous story of young love set in the stark background of slum streets in New York City. The young couple falls in love amid the dreary New York slums where hostility reigns between American and Puerto Rican youths who hate each other and engage in "rumbles" using switch-blades.

West Side Story is based on the dance-conception by Jerome Robbins and the libretto by Arthur Laurents, the lyrics by Stephen Sondheim. Leonard Bernstein contributed the music which ranges from lyrical, joyous and romantic, to the shrill and exciting dance accompaniments in the street-fighting episodes.

Tuition for each student enrolled in the summer workshop is provided by the Tacoma Exchange Club. The club will also provide 8 full tuition scholarships for one year at TCC to students with outstanding ability who performed exceptionally in the play, play director Gene Nelson said.

Students featured in lead roles include: Steve Zediker of Wilson as Riff; Glenn Leach of Mt. Tahoma as Tony; Lynn Jacobson of Stadium as Velma; Jim Thomas of Lakes as Bernardo; Lisa Rhea of Foss as Maria and Jennifer Sether of Peninsula as Anita.

The play's technical director is Chuck Cline, music director is Margaret Lobberegt, choreographer is Lori Meade and costume manager is Doris Nelson. Orchestra members include Margaret Lobberegt, piano; Judy Michaels, synthesizer; Chris Gulhaugen, bass and Phil Hansen, percussion.

1. Course Modification: TITLE AND NUMBER CHANGE: From English 101 - Honors English Composition (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab) TO: English 125 - Honors Composition
Tom McLaughlin explained that the content of the course will be different than the English 101 class now being offered on campus. Several concerns were voiced about the numbering, prerequisite, and screening. MOTION: It was moved by Lorraine Stephan and seconded by Paul Michaels that English 101 - Honors English Composition be changed to English 125 - Honors Composition. The motion carried unanimously.

2. New Course Adoption: Nursing 130 - Practice Lab (2 cr/0 lec/4 lab)
Joan Morris explained that the new course is designed for on-campus nursing students and will give the students supervised practice for nursing skills, procedures commonly encountered in hospital settings under simulated conditions. It was noted that this is necessary prior to exposure to hospital work.

MOTION: It was moved by Ed Zimmerman and seconded by Dick Spangler that Nursing 130 be approved by the Curriculum Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

3. Pilot & Experimental Course: Social Science 195 - Connections: Technology and Change (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab)
In Dr. Magden's absence, Bill Packard explained the newspaper course as one which sheds light on the controversies involving science, technology, and society by examining the nature of technological development in an historical context and its relation to contemporary problems. After discussion, it was recommended that the Associate Degree Distribution Assignment be changed to "Other." If there are any problems with this designation, Mr. Packard will contact Dr. Magden. This is an informational item.
4. Pilot & Experimental Course: History 198 - Survey of United States History (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab)
Bill Packard explained that Bellarmine Preparatory School had requested this class for its students, although the course is open to Tacoma high school students and others. He has been working on it with Tanya Brunke. After a discussion regarding the course description and a recommended change, the Committee was in agreement as to the course format.

Lorraine Stephan, Associate Dean for Occupational Education, and Terry Hemmen gave a brief overview of the program. It was noted that the students have the option of two degrees--Arts and Sciences or Associate of Technical Arts Degree. It was noted that the program is designed to meet national accreditation, the program is based on management, rather than nutrition. Several concerns were voiced about the lack of science courses required in the curriculum. After discussion, Miss Stephan and Ms. Hemmen said the Advisory Committee will be asked to review the science courses in order to make a determination as to which would be the most appropriate as an elective for this program, and also that students be advised to take a science course. The presentors were commended for their work on the Dietetic Technician Program.

The meeting was called to order at 1:10 p.m., by Chairman Dr. Jack Hyde.

New Business

1. Pilot and Experimental Course: Continuing Education 197 - Small Business Marketing (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab)
Tanya Brunke explained the course as one designed primarily for Peninsula/Gig Harbor residents enrolled in previous small business management courses. The course is open to anyone interested in marketing, but primarily is designed for owners and operators of small businesses to learn principles of marketing.
2. Pilot and Experimental Course: Continuing Education 198 - Instrument Ground School (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab)
George Rother, Program Assistant for Continuing Education and Community Services, said the course will prepare students to pass the Instrument Pilot Written Test (FAA), and had been requested by people in the community since there is no course available in Pierce County through public institutions.
3. Pilot and Experimental Course: Continuing Education 199 - Parent-Child Interactions (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab)
Tanya Brunke, Associate Dean for Continuing Education and Community Services, explained that this course is similar to a Home and Family Life course (5 credits), but a request had come from East Side residents for a shorter course that would deal with communication, disciplining and dealing with problem behavior of children. Concern was expressed about credit(s) and the textbook cost. Dr. Magden mentioned that video tapes are available from the Parent Effectiveness Training telecourse. Dr. Hyde suggested that the textbook cost be researched, and possible financial aid for area residents.
4. Pilot and Experimental Course: Drama 198 - Camera Techniques in Acting (5 cr/3 lec/2 lab)
The course, initiated by Chuck Cline through the Continuing Education and Community Services Office, was described by Mrs. Brunke as one of interest to the general public, but in particular, the senior citizens. The acting class in camera techniques will consist of camera exercises, character development, formal scene work; all activities will be video-taped. Plans are to offer the course Fall Quarter in the evening.

5. Pilot and Experimental Course: Economics 198 - Current Economic Issues and Inflation Management in the Home (5 cr/5 lec/0 lab)

This course, designed for Peninsula/Gig Harbor residents, is a "spin-off" of a course offered earlier in consumer education and personal finance. Mrs. Brunke said the Citizens' Advisory Committee in that area had requested the course.

All of the above pilot and experimental courses were presented as information items.

MOTION: It was moved by Dr. Ronald Magden and seconded by Gary Sigmen that the rules be suspended and action be taken at this meeting on all new items. The motion carried unanimously.

6. New Course Adoption: Home and Family Life 120 - Clothing Education (5 cr/3 lec/2 lab)

Mrs. Brunke explained that the new course had been requested by the population at Purdy Treatment Center for Women. After discussion, the following motion was made:

MOTION: It was moved by Dr. Ronald Magden and seconded by Bill Packard that Home and Family Life 120 be adopted by the Curriculum Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

7. Course Modification: TITLE CHANGE: Social Science 235 (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) FROM: Group Process Techniques TO: Assertiveness Training and Communication Skills

8. Course Modification: TITLE CHANGE: Social Science 240 (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) FROM: Assertiveness Training and Communication Skills to Group Process Techniques

Bill Packard, Division Chairman for the Behavioral and Social Sciences, said that the titles were reversed in the Volunteer Management Program brochure; therefore, the request to change the titles.

MOTION: It was moved by Dr. Ronald Magden and seconded by Lorraine Stephan that the titles be changed for Social Science 235 and 240, with approval by the Curriculum Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

9. New Course Adoption: Health Technology 214 - Principles of Coding by ICD 9-CM (2 cr/0 lec/0 lab)

Carolyn Anderson, Division Chairman for Allied Health, said that this is an introductory course in coding diseases, symptoms, operations and procedures according to International Class of Diseases - 9 Edition designed for persons employed in state funding agencies, hospital Medical Records Departments and business offices, physicians' offices and other health care delivery sites. She noted that it was requested by the Advisory Committee, is an elective for an Associate Degree in Technical Arts, and can be taken as an independent study course or in the classroom.

MOTION: It was moved by Frank Garratt and seconded by Tanya Brunke that Health Technology 214 be approved by the Curriculum Committee. The motion carried unanimously.
