Media specialist Nick Huddleston has calculated that, in film wear alone, the average cost of a film showing is three dollars.

That amount does not include the cost of staff time, machine wear or bulb replacements.

Doreen Amoroso explains:

"Although one of Nick's major objectives is to facilitate individual access to learning resources in various media formats, he and his staff cannot cater to students whenever they fail to attend scheduled class showings.

"For this reason, it will be the AV policy henceforth that re-play requests should be authorized by an instructor or appropriate staff member.

"If you feel that it is important that a student see a film, the AV department will try to accomodate, plus consider the cost in judging the importance."

ACCOUNTING STUDENTS DO WELL

In spring 1975, a number of TCC's first-year accounting students took part in the 1974-75 American Institute of Certified Public Accountants accounting testing program.

Forty TCC students, tested as an additional part of the program, scored at the 65th percentile, which was eleven points higher than the four-year school average and fifteen points higher than the community college average.

The test was prepared and scored by the AICPA. It was administered in 154 universities, four-year and two-year colleges throughout the nation.

A. New Course Proposals:

Designation, Title, Degree Distribution, Frequency

- Emergency Medical Care III (2), Emergency Medical Technician Refresher, Technical (Cont. Ed.), Occasional
- (<u>Description</u>: A 20-hour refresher training course required for recertification as Emergency Medical Technician/Ambulance in the State of Washington.) Cost: -0-
- 2. Economics 211 (5), Survey of Economics, Soc. Science, F-W-Sp-Su (Description: A one-quarter, general survey of economics designed specifically for non-majors. Includes such topics as effects of government taxation and spending, operation of the market system, operation of the central bank and money supply, monopolies and their effects. Special emphasis on current issues in economics. No prerequisites required.) Cost: Text \$7
- 3. Medical Records Technology 132*, Medical Terminology, Technical (Occ. Ed.), Spring (Description: The course includes instruction and practice in identifying, defining and spelling terms related to systemic disorders, geriatrics and psychogeriatrics, oncology, anesthesiology, physical therapy, therapeutic radiology, nuclear medicine and clinical laboratory tests. Recommended for Medical Records Technology and Medical Secretary students. Required for Medical Transcriptionists.) Cost: -0-
- 4. Medical Records Technology 142*, Advanced Medical Transcription, Technical (Occ. Ed.), Spring
- (Description: A specialty course in medical transcription for persons enrolled in the Medical Transcription, Medical Records Technology or Medical Secretary programs. The course includes instruction and practice in transcribing from actual dictation belts. In addition, the student will spend 80 hours (ten 8-hour days) in clinical experience at one of the hospitals participating in the program.) Cost to student: \$2.00 for supplies.
- 5. Nursing 221* (1), Current Diet Therapy, Technical (Cont. Ed.), Occasional (Description: This course will emphasize recent advances in dietotherapy and will relate this to modified diets currently in use and will involve theoretical application of principles of diet modification. The Pierce County Diet Manual is covered in this course.) Cost: Supplies (film) \$5.00; Cost to student: Text \$2.50
