1. Report of Ed Zimmerman's presentation to LAC regarding instructional use of the computer-

CSI (Computer Supplemented Instruction) involves use of the computer as an instructional resource or tool- for example, to prepare graphs, produce test variations, or provide special drill sequences for students. According to Ed Zimmerman, Chairman of the Computer Programming Committee, CSI probably offers the most practical instructional application of the computer for Tacoma Community College at this time.

In a presentation to the Learning Assistance Committee on May 3, Mr. Zimmerman compared the more costly CAI (Computer Assisted Instruction) with a programmed text involving extensive direct student interaction with the computer. PLATO is an example of CAI.

In CMI (Computer Managed Instruction) the computer is not used for direct instruction, but is programmed to manage student progress through an instructional system involving a variety of techniques and resources. It requires extensive pre-planning and is only cost effective for large scale application RSVP (Response System with Variable Prescription), on loan from Miami Dade, is an example of CMI.

Noting that TCC's instructional computer terminals are connected with programs at SWU and EWSC, Mr. Zimmerman passed around samples from WSU's Student Scheduled Repeatable Testing. This program provides for recall of selected questions, by category, from a preprogrammed bank of test questions. As a guide to students who miss questions, the print-out includes referrals from each question to an appropriate source of information.

After surveying the computer as an instructional resource, Mr. Zimmerman briefly demonstrated console interaction on two locally developed student drill programs, one in Spanish vocabulary and one on hospital and medical records.



he meeting was called to order at 2:55 p.m. by chairman Bob Rhule.

11d Business

Course Modification: Biology 205 - Change of Number, Title, Credits TO: Biology 120 -Genetics (5 cr/5 lec) FROM: Human Genetics (3 cr/3 lec/0 lab) Ivonna McCabe explained that the course is for non-majors and requires no prerequisite. She said that students in sociology, psychology and anthropology should be encouraged to take it. The course is to achieve two things: (1) clarify some misconceptions about inherited traits, and (2) help students read and understand popular publications discussing genetics.

MOTION: It was moved by Bob Thornburg and seconded by Bill Packard that Biology 205 - Genetics, be approved for adoption into the college curriculum. The motion passed unanimously.

New Course: Engineering 220 - Introduction to Mechanics of Materials (4 cr/3 lec/2 discussion) Prerequisite: Engineering 180; Distribution: Math/Science New Course: Engineering 299 - Independent Study (Variable Credit 1-5)

New Course: Physics 299 - Independent Study (Variable Credit 1-5)

Ken Gentili explained that Engineering 220 is a necessary part of the engineering program for TCC students who wish to transfer. He explained Engineering 299 and Physics 299 as mechanisms whereby students can do special work beyond the regular classes.

> MOTION: It was moved by Paul Michaels and seconded by Ron Magden that items 2, 3 and 4 be approved by the Curriculum Committee. The motion passed unanimously.

New Course: Math 94 - Basic Voc. Tech. Math I (Variable Credit 1-3); Prerequisite: Math 86

New Course: Math 95 - Basic Voc. Tech. Math II (Variable Credit 1-2); Prerequisite: Math 94

Bill Wittenfeld explained that Math 94 and 95 (with variable credit) will be taught in the math lab and will cover 20 different areas. He asked that "permission of instructor" be noted on both classes for the curriculum files and the schedules.

> MOTION: It was moved by Ron Magden and seconded by Doreen Amoroso that Math 94 and 95 be approved for adoption into the curriculum. The motion carried unanimously.

7. Course Modification: FROM: Study Skills 45 to English 83 - Vocabulary Development; To place the course in the proper sequence of the English 80 series.

3. Course Modification: FROM: Study Skills 46 to English 84 - Spelling Review; To place

the course in the proper sequence in the English 80 series.

9. Course Modification: FROM: Study Skills 41 to: Reading Skills 80. Reason: The emphasis IN Study Skills 41 is on reading. Also, this change will place all developmental workshop courses in the 80 numbering system. 10. Course Modification: Number Change: FROM: Study Skills 47 to Study Skills 80 - Library Orientation: Readon - To place developmental workshop courses in the 80 numbering system.

MOTION: It was moved by Jack Heinrick and seconded by Bob Thornburg that items 7, 8, 9 and 10 be approved by the Curriculum Committee.

The motion carried unanimously.

11. Course Modification: Title Change: Women's Studies 100 FROM: What About Woman? TO: Assertiveness Training. Reason: Describes course; encourages male enrollment.

MOTION: It was moved by Lloyd Berntson and seconded by Jack Heinrick that the course modification for Women's Studies 100 be tabled until a later time. The motion carried unanimously.

New Business

 Ron Magden requested that History 92, which had been tabled at an earlier meeting, be returned to the next agenda.

Other

- 1. Dr. Rhule: (a) Asked that division and department chairmen complete updating of the course outlines in the curriculum file in his office; (b) Announced that faculty members will be receiving a form to evaluate the Dean of Instruction. He encouraged comments which will help him perform his duties more effectively; (c) Announced that the Curriculum Committee scheduled for May 18 will be held on May 25; and (d) Asked that results of department chairmen elections be tabulated so they can be sent to the president for confirmation.
- 2. Paul Michaels reminded everyone of the TCC Spring Festival May 13, 14, 15.
- Chuck Summers noted that TCC's music department had hosted the high school band contest. About 1,000 high school students were on campus.

The meeting adjourned at 3:25 p.m. The next meeting of the Curriculum Committee will be held on May 25 at 2:45 p.m. in Building 1-12.
