TWO NEW BOARD MEMBERS TO JOIN TCC TRUSTEES

The college was notified by the Governor's office March 7 that two new trustees had been assigned to the TCC Board.

They are Dr. Barbara Wesley and Alan P. Vandervert.

Mr. Vandervert's appointment is for one year. He replaces Lewis Hatfield, whose term would have expired in April 1978.

Dr. Wesley will replace Rev. Robert Yamashita April 4. Her appointment is for five years.

Mr. Vandervert has been corporate secretary and attorney for Weyerhaeuser since 1962. He has lived in Tacoma since that year, is married and has three children. He earned his A.B. degree from Stanford University and his J.D. from Columbia.

Mr. Vandervert says he is looking forward to serving on TCC's Board. "I have always been interested in the community college and its place in the educational system," he said.

Dr. Wesley is community lab placement specialist at Stadium High school. She has her doctorate in educational planning and management from the University of Massachusetts and her Master's degree in school administration from the University of Puget Sound.

Her B.A. was also from UPS in elementary education.

She has participated in a variety of adult education institutes including two sponsored by the National Science Foundation. She has served as project director, competency-based teacher education for minorities, Westfield State College, Westfield, Mass., and has taught in the Tacoma Public School System and in California.

Dr. Wesley has had several articles published and is a member of numerous professional organizations.

She has two children, one of whom is a student at TCC.

NATIONAL SHAKESPEARE COMPANY

TO PERFORM

TCC is sponsoring the appearance of The National Shakespeare Company in two plays Saturday, March 19, at the Tacoma Bicentennial Pavilion.

"Romeo and Juliet" will be presented at 8 p.m., and "The Comedy of Errors" at 3 p.m.

In addition, the company will conduct a special workshop at 10 a.m. in the Pavilion free to all ticket holders.

The National Shakespeare Company is a New York state non-profit organization which since 1963 has performed to about 250,000 people annually in colleges, universities and high schools across the country.

Co-founder and artistic director of the company is Philip Meister. He is a theater master of 25 years. Prior to becoming an independent producer he worked as an assistant to Serge Koussevitsky at Tanglewood and was directing fellow at the American Shakespeare Academy. He has directed many off-Broadway and Broadway productions and founded two off-Broadway theaters.

Among professional directors who have staged past National Shakespeare Company productions are John Houseman, Gene Frankel, Maurice Edwards, David Bamberger and Malcolm Black.

Meister is director of the Tacoma production of "Romeo and Juliet" while Sue Lawless is director of "The Comedy of Errors."

Sue Lawless directed last year's New York Theater company production of "The Fantasticks" and "Spoon River Anthology."

A performer as well as director, Ms. Lawless has appeared with her comedy partner, Ted Pugh, on many

talk shows including "The Tonight Show" and "Merv Griffin."

She has directed Marjorie Lord and Mark Miller in "Forty Carats," Joan Bennet in "Butterflies are Free," Gale Storm in "No Hard Feelings," and many other productions. She received the Drama Desk nomination as outstanding director for "In Gay Company."

DISSERTATION RESEARCH GRANT

PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

The U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Office of Human Development, Administration on Aging, has announced its 1977 grant program.

The dissertation research program will provide one-year research grants to universities to support dissertation research in the field of social gerontology or aging related areas.

It is proposed to award twenty individual \$5,000 research grants to qualified universities for research activities set forth in approved research proposals. No supplemental allowances will be provided.

Nineteen seventy-seven Social Science doctoral candidates interested in aging are invited to apply to the appropriate department of their respective universities for the grants.

Re: Vocational Certification

Vocational certification and recertification will be a Spring, 1977, "happening." In order to expedite the review process, please go over the following checklist. Note that in addition to those staff who are typically thought of as "vocational instructors," and who must, by law, maintain their certification, it is STRONGLY recommended that staff who are presently or who will possibly be teaching "vocational" courses be encouraged to acquire certification.

INDUSTRIAL SAFETY & HYGIENE

REQUIRED FOR ALL CONTRACTED VOCATIONAL PERSONNEL who teach or supervise a vocational class or program in the common schools and community colleges in the State. (Needs to be taken only once)

HOW TO MEET THE REQUIREMENT

The Self-Instructional Program on Industrial Safety & Hygiene for Vocational Certification is completely self-instructional and contains seven modules and a final exam. The main purpose of this instructional series is to enable the learner to:

- a) Identify the components of a safe educational environment.
- b) Demonstrate through example (teach) and motivate students to be safe workers.

Each module includes measurable objectives, a slide/tape series that provides immediate feedback, self-assessment exercises and printed materials.

These self-assessment exercises can be utilized as pre- or post-tests to determine learner achievement of the objectives for that unit. When the learner has mastered all the materials to his satisfaction, he is then ready to take the final exam.

Length of the Program

- Module #1: Introduction to Safety: Slide/tape series=20 min.
Response to written assessment=40 min.: COMPLETE UNIT 1 in 60 min.
- Module #2: Classification & Responsibility for Accidents:
Slide/tape series=20 min.
Response to written assessment=40 min.: COMPLETE UNIT 2 in 60 min.
- Module #3: Classes of Accidents: Slide/tape series=20 min.
Response to written assessment=40 min.: COMPLETE UNIT 3 in 60 min.
- Module #4: Accident Causes-Workers:Slide/tape series=20 min.
Response to written assessment=40 min.:COMPLETE UNIT 4 in 60 min.
- Module #5: Accident Causes-Unsafe Conditions:
Slide/tape series=20 min.
Response to written assessment=40 min.:COMPLETE UNIT 5 in 60 min.
- Module #6: Noise:
Slide/tape series=20 min.
Response to written assessment=40 min.:COMPLETE UNIT 6 in 60 min.
- Module #7: Washington Industrial Safety & Hygiene Act Background & Provisions: Audio tape=10 min.

TOTAL TIME TO COMPLETE - Approximately 6 - 7 hours.

PROCEDURES:

Introduction to Industrial Safety & Hygiene is a self-contained program geared for individual study. It can be completed in an average of six to seven hours. The program can be broken into blocks of time convenient to the learner. This program is for use in the Library at TCC and can be studied individually or several persons may study together.

THE FOLLOWING DIRECTIONS WILL AID THE LEARNER:

1. The package of materials will be at the Circulation Desk of the Library on reserve under the title Industrial Safety & Hygiene.
2. The complete package consists of: booklet, seven audio tapes, and three slide trays.
3. Read the introduction and the general objectives for each module.
4. View and listen to the slide/tape. You may wish to follow along with the script in the booklet.
5. Complete the self-test at the end of each module.
6. At the completion of the seven programs, take the final exam. The test can be secured at the Associate Dean for Occupational Education's office. You must attain 70% mastery or better. The exam consists of fifty multiple choice questions on statistical data and concepts presented in the program. It should take 1/2 to one hour to complete. This test is to be taken in the area of the Associate Dean's office and returned to her secretary immediately upon completion.
7. The secretary will score the exam and identify the percentage mastery.
8. The Associate Dean for Occupational Education's office will prepare a statement for the Olympia office notifying them that you have met the requirement.

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FIRST AID

A valid first aid certificate is REQUIRED for the same instructors mentioned under "Industrial Safety and Hygiene" EXCEPT:

- a) Vocational Counselors
- b) Those who teach related subjects to vocational students; i.e., mathematics, English or communication skills, etc., when those are taught in classrooms rather than shops and are part of a total vocational program that is under the supervision or direction of vocational instructor(s) possessing valid first aid certificates.
- c) Physicians, registered nurses, licensed practical nurses, and others whose occupational competencies include first aid knowledge equal to or superior to that represented by the first aid certification being required under these regulations.
- d) Vocational instructors who teach 90 hours or less per school year and whose instruction is a part of a total vocational program that is under the supervision or direction of a vocational instructor(s) possessing valid first aid certificates.

This requirement may be met by taking P.E. 292 (3) First Aid and Safety, 2-4:30 p.m., Wednesday, Spring Quarter, 1977.

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IN ADDITION (OTHER)

In September, 1977, vocational certification will expire for many; I hope we can certify these people, at least, for the five-year certificate. Others are not certified or are teaching under a temporary certificate.

Certification requirements in addition to the Industrial Safety and Hygiene and First Aid are as follows:

- A. One-year vocational certificate, first issue: (Verified at the time of initial employment)
 1. Relevant academic preparation, approved by a selection committee or vocational director.
 2. Two years of full-time paid working experience in teaching subject area.
 3. Evidence of six months full-time work experience in subject area within two years prior to certification.
 4. A contract of employment with Tacoma Community College.

- B. For a one-year certificate renewal: Complete the following during the first year of employment
 1. Fifteen hours orientation at Tacoma Community College.
 2. First Aid Certificate (when applicable).
- NOTE: Part-time personnel who have taught less than 70 credit hours for TCC will receive additional one-year certificate renewals without additional requirements.

A part-time instructor teaches 10 or less credits per quarter and 5 or less during summer session.

For a three-year vocational certificate: Personnel can renew a one-year certificate twice while completing improvement unit requirements to the 3 or 5-year certificate.

C. For a three-year vocational certificate: Should satisfy the following during the first two years of employment.

1. Two years of vocationally certified teaching or counseling experience (more than 70 hrs.).
2. Course: Elements of Teaching (3 cr.)
3. Safety and Hygiene (15 hours).
 - a) General
 - b) Specific

D. For a five-year vocational certificate: Complete nine professional units as follows:

1. A three-year Vocational Certificate or two years of Vocational Certified teaching or counseling experience (more than 70 credit hours).
2. Course: Occupational Analysis and Program Planning (3 cr.= 3 Prof. units).
3. Course: (Instructors only) Course Organization (3 cr.=3 Prof. units).
4. Professional Improvement (3 units from the following):
 - a) Course (1 cr.=1 Prof. unit)
 - b) Field Work (1 week=1 cr.=1 Prof. Unit).

c) Conference/Seminar (1 day=1/5 cr.=1/5 Prof. unit).

d) Travel (1 day=1/5 cr.=1 Prof. unit)

E. For a five-year vocational certificate renewal: Complete fifteen professional units as follows:

1. Courses (1 cr.=1 Prof. unit)
2. Field Work (1 week=1cr.=1 Prof. unit with 7 unit minimum)
3. Conference (1 day=1/5 cr.=1/5 Prof. unit)
4. Travel (1 day=1/5 cr.=1/5 Prof. unit)
