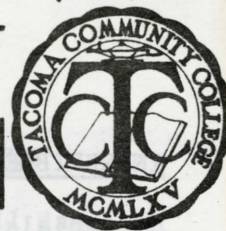

Individual donations at the bank
are also needed between drives.

Each person who uses the reserve
is saved the thirty-dollar replace-
ment fee for the first pint. And
any member of the TCC faculty, staff
and student body can borrow from the
account.

Anyone can donate, provided they
meet the health and age require-
ments. Donators under 18 need per-
mission from their parents.

Friday--Fish and chips with french fries, cole slaw and tartar sauce, \$1.19.

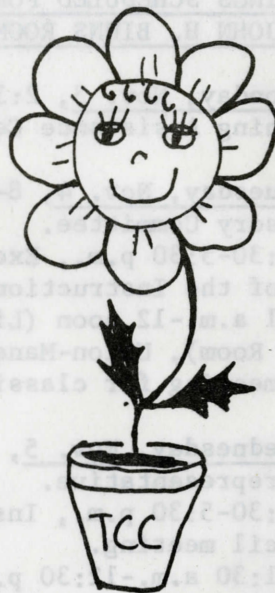

HIGH SCHOOL TEACHER
RESEARCHES BLACK HISTORY

A Bellevue high school teacher is researching the history of black people in the Pacific Northwest and has put out a call for old diaries, letters, photographs, press clippings, and stories passed down through families.

Ralph Hayes, a Newport High School history teacher, is researching little known facts and folklore of black history extending back to territorial days.

The project is sponsored by the Seattle-King County American Revolution Bicentennial Commission.

Hayes hopes to collect an educational archive for students studying black history and is especially interested in tape-recording interviews about first-hand or family experience.

Old Business

1. Winter Schedule -- The Winter schedule development was discussed. It is hoped that the schedule can be distributed on November 7. There was a discussion of various ways to cut down the number of copies printed.

New Business

New Course Proposals

1. Emergency Medical Care 111 (2) - Emergency Medical Technician - Refresher -- Joan Royce explained EMC 111 as a continuing education course for Emergency Medical Technicians. This course is a State requirement for the continuing certification of EMTs. Joan noted that there is special funding for this course.
2. Medical Records Technology 132* (3) - Medical Terminology
3. Medical Records Technology 142* (3) - Advanced Medical Transcription -- Joan Royce explained that 132 will deal with advanced medical terminology. MRT 142 is an advanced medical transcription course which includes some clinical practice. These two courses have been recommended by the TCC Medical Records Advisory Committee. Upon questioning, Lorraine Stephan said she would check to see if the courses are funded through categorical or non-categorical funding.
4. Nursing 221 (1) - Current Diet Therapy -- This course was described by Joan Royce as a continuing education course which has been requested by the hospitals in the community.
5. Economics 211 (5) - Survey of Economics -- Gary Sigmen explained the proposed course as one designed specifically for non-majors in business and economics. This course will be substituted for some of the existing sections in Economics 200 starting spring quarter, thus better meeting the needs of the students. (He noted that less than half of the current economics students are majoring in business or economics.) Suggestions were: (1) send an information sheet about this course to all advisers before registration; (2) explain the difference between this course and the present economic courses when writing copy for next year's course catalog.

Action on all new course proposals will be taken at next week's meeting.

Other

1. TCC Computer Coordinating Committee -- Lorraine Stephan commented on the value of the computer as an instructional tool, and urged all departments to make themselves aware of the activities of the Computer Coordinating Committee. The committee will meet again at 1:30 p.m., November 7, in Building 17.

The meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p.m. The next meeting of the Executive Committee will be held on Tuesday, November 4, at 2:30 p.m., in the John Binns Room of the Resource Center.
