AVAILABLE**

Copies of the TCC Downtown Center Proposal have been placed in the faculty lounges in Buildings 9, 12, 19 and 20 and with Janette Bratrud in Building 7 for study by faculty.

BOARD HIGHLIGHTS

Tacoma Community College may be establishing a TCC Downtown Center at the site of St. Leo's school at 1324 South Yakima Street.

The TCC Board of Trustees Thursday afternoon took under consideration for study and review a proposal for a downtown center at that location.

Preliminary work for the project has been handled by Joe Kosai, TCC dean of community service and continuing education and Tanya Brunke, program assistant for community education programs.

Once the board approves the idea, final negotiations with St. Leo's will be pursued. Kosai says that offices will be occupied at the new site by September 1, with plans for classes to start fall quarter.

"We're trying to provide a location convenient to people who otherwise cannot come to the central campus on twelfth and Pearl," Kosai said.

"There has been an increased need for many people to retrain. People who have already graduated from four-year schools often want to come back to the community college for training in new skills or brushing up their old ones. Programming emphasis will center on the needs of nearly 20,000 employees who work in the downtown area. They will have the opportunity to attend classes close to where they work so they can come at lunch, after work or before work.

"We will serve these people at the downtown center, along with elderly, veterans and many other groups," Kosai explained.

Services set up for the new site include admissions and registration, the administration of the G.E.D. (high school completion) test, general testing and counseling, veterans' administration advising, financial aid and general information.

Classes will include all types of credit and non-credit classes, developmental education, occupational classes and special programs and seminars. The possibility of offering noontime physical activities in the center is being considered.

Kosai added that the TCC Life Long Learning Institute which allows persons over sixty to take special classes for two dollars, will offer programs at the downtown site.

"We are taking the service to the clientele," Kosai observed. "In accordance with the college's goals to serve the community, we are trying to make it easier for people to avail themselves of their community college."

In other business the Board:

- Referred the renewal of contracts for Virginia Liebergesell, Marion Miller, Gene Nelson and Joan Reilly to the President for action.
- Granted Dave Hendrickson a professional leave for the 1978-79 academic year in the area of business to gain practical experience.
- Listened to a report from Dr. Batdorf concerning the mandated increase in operational fees, and clarified the fact that an increase in Student and Activities fees was not under consideration at this month's meeting. Dr. Batdorf said such an increase could well be proposed once a new system of student government has been established and the future needs analyzed.

REQUIREMENT
CHANGED

The department of Labor and Industries stopped accepting any first aid course that does not include CPR as part of the curriculum March 1, 1978.

First aid cards issued on or after this date, for courses not including CPR must be accompanied by separate certification of the training.

First aid cards issued before March 1 will be honored until their expiration date.

In addition, renewal requirements will be as follows:

A) Certificates less than 2 years old -- renewed after an 8 hour program.

B) Certificates over 2 years old but less than 3 years -- renewal after a 12 hour program.

All instructors, those presently vocationally certified and those working for certification, as well as other staff interested in obtaining a current first aid card should call Lorraine Stephan's office at 5024 and indicate which program, 8-hour, 12-hour or new, needed to be taken Fall, 1978, quarter.

"Sooner or later a man, if he is wise, discovers that life is a mixture of good days and bad, victory and defeat, give and take. He learns that it does not pay to be too sensitive about his own feelings, and that he should let some things go over his head like water off a duck's back. He learns that all men have burnt toast for breakfast now and then, and that he shouldn't take the other fellow's grouch too seriously. He learns that carrying a chip on his shoulder is the easiest way to get into a fight. He learns that the quickest way to become unpopular is to carry tales and gossip about others. He learns that most people are human and that it doesn't do any harm to smile and say "good morning" even if it is raining. EXECUTIVE ORDER

RESCINDING EO 77-14, STATE EXPENDITURE REDUCTIONS

WHEREAS, on November 8, 1977, the voters of the State of Washington approved an initiative which exempted most food products from retail sales and use taxes; and

WHEREAS, on November 10, 1977, an Executive Order was issued directing all executive branch agencies to adhere to an expenditure reduction plan until such time as the impact of the initiative could be better assessed; and

WHEREAS, the latest economic reports for the State of Washington enable a more accurate assessment of projected state revenues, and the outlook for the State of Washington is for continued economic growth; and

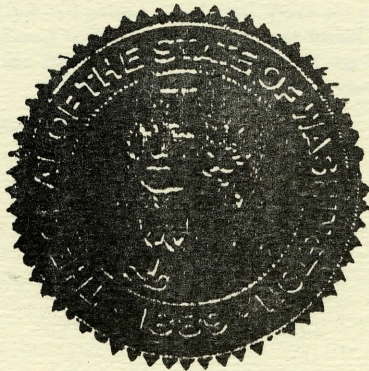
WHEREAS, the revenue collections for the current fiscal year are higher than anticipated and can be expected to exceed earlier forecasts throughout the biennium; and


WHEREAS, the prospects for a balanced state budget for the current biennium can be assured without further reduction of authorized expenditure levels and it is my desire to minimize program disruptions and unnecessary administrative procedures.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Dixy Lee Ray, Governor of the State of Washington, do hereby rescind Executive Order 77-14 effective March 20, 1978.


PROVIDED, HOWEVER, all agency directors shall be expected to continue, when feasible, policies designed to restrict the growth of state government employment and to apply stringent controls to travel, personal services contracting and all other objects of expenditure. To this end, I will be issuing an administrative directive detailing specific control guidelines. I have also directed the Office of Financial Management to define reporting procedures so I can monitor agency staffing levels and travel expenditures.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the State of Washington to be affixed at Olympia this 17th day of March, A.D., 1978.

Re: Community College Consultant Position at the Washington State
University Computing Service Center

One year ago, a joint project involving WSU and the community colleges created a special rotating position in the WSU Computing Center for community college data processing and computing faculty. The post has as objective the technical upgrade of these faculty and the provision of consulting support for community college instructional data processing and computing programs.

The post is partially funded at \$10500 per academic year (9 months) by WSU with additional salary funds provided by the community college system. The source of the additional funds for 1978-79 is not yet clear, but it is hoped that SBCCE support will be forthcoming. This past year the additional funds were provided on a leave-with-pay basis by the community college sponsoring this year's participant. WSU also provides travel funds, computer time, and technical support to the community college faculty member selected.

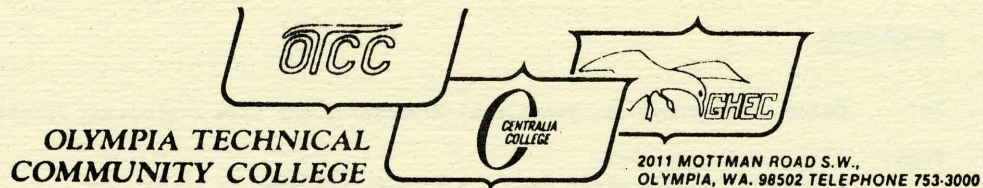
This project has proven to be a great asset to instructional computing in the community college system, in general, and an invaluable aid to the participating faculty member. A constant and serious problem facing data processing faculty is the maintenance of technical skills. Here is a golden opportunity for community college instructional staff to learn, do research, and travel about the community college system in the interest of instructional computing. Although some effort is required on the part of the person filling the post, the rewards are enormous.

Interested data processing and computing instructors in the community college system who wish to apply for the position at WSU, or just wish to know more about the job, should contact me at Lower Columbia College, Longview, Washington, 98632, before April 15, 1978. By that time funding sources for the community college portion of the salary should be firm.

Although WSU is currently the only participant in this kind of a faculty-upgrade project, ICRMG is seeking other agencies and organizations to involve in the concept. It is hoped that one day a number of positions of the type discussed will be available around the state. Your support and interest in this long-range goal would be greatly appreciated by us of ICRMG.

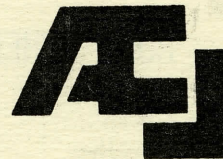

The Center for Community Education (AACJC) announces that applications are being accepted for six-month fellowships in community education. The fellowships are made possible by a grant from the Charles Stewart Mott Foundation.

**ACTION
ORIENTED
LEARNING
EXPERIENCES:**

This fellowship is a flexible learning experience. Examples of the type of activities are:

- . projects designed to increase an institution's ability to be responsive to community needs;
- . projects designed to promote/increase state and local linkages among agencies devoted to the delivery of human services;
- . projects designed to gather data/study the impact of state or federal policies/funding patterns on community education.

DURATION:

The fellowship will be for six consecutive months. The dates are flexible, but they must be completed by December 31, 1978. Individuals who can devote full-time to the experience are preferred candidates. Consideration will be given, however, to applicants who must retain their professional position and devote a small percentage of time to it.

STIPEND:

The fellowship award is \$5,000., (not tax-exempt) payable bi-weekly, for living expenses. No graduate credit is involved.

The proposal submitted for this fellowship should include the following information:

- . Why you are applying for this community education fellowship.
- . Brief discussion of the skills and experience which you feel enhance your consideration for this fellowship.

- . How your activity will contribute to the growth of collaborative working relationships among community colleges, community schools and other agencies.
- . Information about community involvement in the activity.
- . Additionally, your application should contain supporting letters from those individuals and/or institutions with whom you propose to work.

The C. S. Mott Fellowship may be proposed as a field experience or in Washington, D.C.
